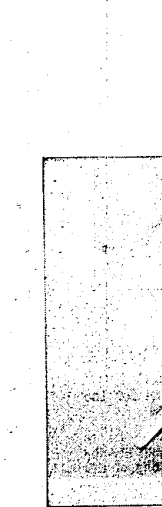
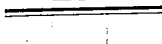

The group left by train from Detroit Friday morning. They arrived in Banff, Alberta, Canada, on Sunday and stayed overnight at the Banff Springs Hotel. On Monday they went on to Lake Louise, Canada, and spent the night at the Chateau Lake Louise. The young tourists arrived at Vancouver, British Columbia, on Wednesday.

The trip to Alaska will be made aboard the SS Princess Louise leaving on Friday. Planning For Area Disaster Needed, Doctor Asserts

When a disaster strikes, 20 per cent of the survivors will "lose their heads" or lose control of themselves; and be of no value to those trying to establish order, says a University of Michigan surgeon.

Dr. C. Thomas Flotte, instructor in Surgery at the University of Michigan Medical School and University Hospital, states that one fifth of disaster victims experience a complete psychological block.

He said that to evaluate what has taken place or respond quickly to emergency needs. Only one out of five survivors will be alert and capable of immediate action, while 60 per cent become momentarily paralyzed but are able to think clearly and assist the injured after a brief period.

Medical handling of emergency disaster victims today requires much more knowledge than "what to do until the doctor arrives," Dr. Flotte states. It requires that all persons possible know the right things to do to aid an injured person in an emergency situation—how to stop bleeding and give adequate respiration. He suggests that every citizen take a course in first aid. The Red Cross offers this type of instruction in most communities.

Dr. Flotte maintains that disaster planning should begin in our schools. He advocates that citizens, both young and old, learn to act by habit in an actual emergency situation. He states that although planning for local disasters such as fires or explosions, and regional disasters such as tornadoes or floods, is now taking place, a mass casualty situation, such as that created by an atomic bomb explosion, involving thousands of victims, must be planned for by government agencies, with the support of the people.

"Thinking on such a scale must be made a part of our background if we are to reduce the number of individuals who cannot think and act quickly in a disaster," he concluded.

Water Resources Study To Be Made

A cooperative state-federal watershed research project will be launched in Michigan next month to investigate water management problems.

Negotiations for the project recently were completed by Dr. J. W. Leonard, assistant deputy director of the Michigan Conservation Department, and Dr. M. B. Dickerman, director of the Lakes States forest experiment station.

The initial fieldwork, to begin in June, will be conducted in the northern lower peninsula and will study the effects of different uses and treatments in forests and wetlands on water resources.

Because more than half the land in Michigan is classified as "forest land," findings of the research project will have wide application and serve as a valuable source of information in solving water problems of industries, sportsmen, farmers and city dwellers.

The need for research in this field has been recognized for a number of years because of water and erosion problems in Michigan.

These areas watershed problems will form the framework upon which the research project will be built, Leonard and Dickerman said.

John L. Arend, leader of the Lakes States station's research center in East Lansing, will be in charge of the research work and professor Robert Dils of the University of Michigan will work with the center staff during the summer months.

"The purpose of the trip is to teach boys to save for things worth while in life. Any boy who is willing to learn and save at least a third of his cost is eligible to go," Kuhn said.

For two years from 1945 to 1948 I attended the University of Alaska which is located four miles outside of Fairbanks and for the past six years I have been teaching school at Hazel Park Public Schools," Kuhn said. "I would continue to teach but would like to carry on this great work started by Mr. Buchanan. Willing to give my time, I do not expect to make one cent for conducting these trips and hope to make this an annual affair."

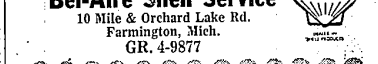

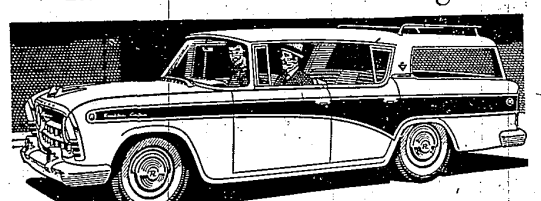

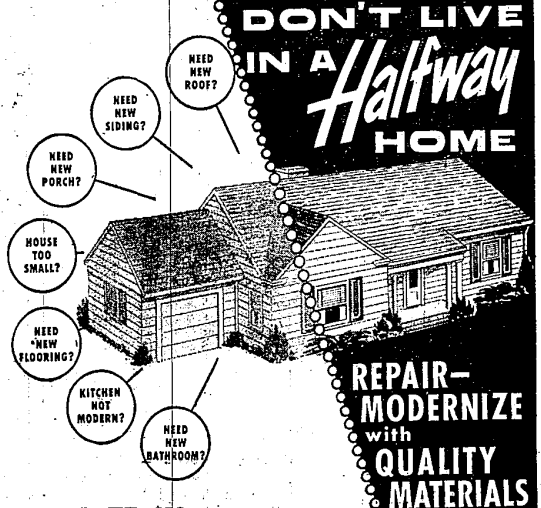
