**Private Shooting Preserves**  
Now Until 1958

Conservation Department officials this week explained in detail why private shooting preserves will not be in operation in Michigan until 1958.

A form letter, in answer to several inquiries, is being mailed to interested persons, outlining the procedures which necessitate a delay in the establishment of preserves.

In the letter, the Department points out that the legislative act which authorizes private shooting preserves is not effective after the legislature adjourns and no action is possible until after that date.

The legislative act itself makes preserve regulations subject to specific legal procedures and codes which will require public hearings and approval by the state Attorney General.

This will involve 30 days for advertising hearings and filing required legal briefs, as well as time for setting up regulations and submitting them to the state Conservation Commission for approval, time for revisions arising out of the public hearings and time for review by the Attorney General.

"After approval, additional time will be needed for such steps as printing regulations and formal submitting applications, inspecting properties, and certifying the number and kind of birds to be shot," the letter explains.

Full compliance with the law would make it impossible for actual licensing of preserves to begin before December, at the earliest. Thus, the requirements for all practical purposes, eliminate shooting preserves for 1957.

Because of this mandatory delay in licensing of preserves until 1958. This will provide time to set up the best possible regulations, based on experience in other states, and to hold adequate hearings, so that the operators also will need considerable time to make preparations after they know the detailed regulations. Department rules must provide controls to prevent abuse of the privilege of hunting during a season longer than the regular open season, the letter concludes.
