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'God's Businessman' To Speak Sunday
At Clarenceville Baptist Church

Guest speaker at the Clarenceville Baptist Church, meeting at the Clarenceville I.O.O.F. Hall, this Sunday, July 21, will be "God's Businessman," Robert G. LeTourneau, president of R. G. LeTourneau Inc., Longview, Texas.

LeTourneau is known throughout the world for his pioneering in the manufacture of modern heavy equipment and for the millions of dollars which he has contributed to further the Christian doctrine in this country and abroad.

He will speak at 11 o'clock in the morning and again at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

LeTourneau began his heavy equipment building business in the early 1920's. By 1929 he had built it into a high enterprise. The LeTourneau Company now is a leader in the heavy equipment building field.

The career of Mr. LeTourneau, however, has been built with a slide rule in one hand and a bible in the other — as evidenced by the fact he is widely referred to today as "God's Businessman." Religious aspect of the title has been earned by the many millions of dollars which he, through the LeTourneau Foundation, has contributed to furthering the Christian doctrine in this country and abroad.

Through the Foundation (which he and his wife endowed in 1935) he contributed more than 20 percent of his worldly goods, including more than half of his company's outstanding stock.

In addition to the financial endowment of the Lord's work, he devotes virtually every weekend serving as a lay preacher — flying more than 100,000 miles per year going throughout the United States and Canada.

In connection with his industrial achievements, Mr. LeTourneau was honored in 1936 by The Franklin Institute in Philadelphia, which awarded him its coveted Frank P. Brown Medal for "revolutionary improvements in earthmoving equipment, with vast benefit to public works and private building construction."

In 1933, Mr. LeTourneau sold his earthmoving equipment business, along with three other company plants, to LeTourneau-Westinghouse Company — a newly-formed subsidiary of the Westinghouse Air Brake Company. As the main plant at Peoria, Illinois, was one of the plants sold, Mr. LeTourneau moved headquarters to Longview, Texas, and there began to devote his time and talents to such fields as logging, off-road transportation, heavy materials handling, offshore drilling, land clearing, and other forms of custom engineering.

An interesting, and important, sidelight on Mr. LeTourneau's manufacturing methods is the fact that he has for many years designed and built his own production machinery, such as lathes, presses, and milling machines. A number of these (particularly jib cranes and hoists) have been made in his own shop.
