"When the door slammed shut and the key turned, the gallant missionary had his own spiritual poverty exposed," said Geoffrey C. Bull to a packed church on his recent visit to the Detroit area.

"Those who worship in Farmington Gospel Chapel, Farmington Road at Kirby, were strengthened and cheered by the messages brought by their renowned visitor.

Mr. Bull, undemonstrative British missionary to Tibet, was taken into custody in October, 1950, and was placed in an old dungeon in a medieval fort in Tibet, and later was taken into Communist China.

In his book "When Iron Gates Yield," Mr. Bull has written interestingly of Tibetan scenery and nomadic life. In his own way he

Now in his own cell, shut away in semi-gloom, on his first of 150 evenings, he finds himself on his knees in tears. When the way had still been open and he had prayed the path he should take, had he been mistaken? Since he was walking by faith, it must have been God who had shut him up with himself.

"In the light of His glory and grace," said Mr. Bull, as he turned the thought upon his listeners, "do we consciously contemplate the Son of the Living God for five minutes a day?"

With only sufficient light to read his Bible an hour or so a day; he began to appreciate it more and more.

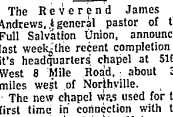
A new experience of peace and rest and comfort was his as he found what the Apostle Paul did in his Roman cell, "Christ only stood by me over all."

"Brain washing is in two stages," he explained.

"First, it was solitary confinement to peruse such literature as they provided. After that, I was put in with a group. This was the pressure period. Each accuses the other. Each threatens the other. Then when this does not produce what is desired, one is kept under threat and fear of death," he said.

"Since God was now my strength and comfort, I soon discovered that there are forces behind the forces and powers behind the powers. In mental affairs today it is conflict of light with darkness as it has always been in the souls of men," Mr. Bull explained.

Finally, after the 150 days of confinement of God, he was brought forth. To his listeners he spoke and appeared as a purged man.



REV. JAMES F. ANDREWS

The Reverend James F. Andrews, general pastor of the Full Salvation Union, announced this week the recent completion of its headquarters chapel at 5150 West 8 Mile Road, about 3/4 miles west of Northville.

The new chapel was used for the first time in connection with the annual Full Salvation Union general gathering held June 30 to July 7. Three services were held each day at 11:00 A.M., 2:00 and 7:30 P.M.

On July 4 the Lloyd H. Green Post of the American Legion in Northville presented a flag for the new chapel and several ministers spoke.

The Full Salvation Union was incorporated as a Michigan Corporation on January 31, 1934 for the purpose of carrying on without profit, religious, educational and charitable work. Its general aim and purpose, the Rev. Andrews explained, is the unification of the Body of Christ in harmony with the prayer of Jesus in the 17th chapter of John where He prayed three times, "That they all may be one, that the world may believe."

"To be saved from hate to love is a Divine experience in conscious realization that must be experienced to be known. Such really is the same in all religious faiths. But all who experience such understand that which they experience in harmony with the way it is understood in their particular environment. Out of these different understandings doctrinal concepts and religious practices are developed that often divide and separate those who have experienced the same reality because it is true that every man's way seems right in his own eyes."

The Full Salvation Union is dedicated to the task of "Endeavoring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace until the day, come to the unity of the faith."

The Rev. Andrews was graduated from Greenville College, Illinois in 1930 and served as a pastor in the Free Methodist denomination for 3 years before founding the Full Salvation Union work.

The present site, a 40 acre tract of land located at 5150 West 8 Mile Road was purchased by the Full Salvation Union in 1955 for the purpose of establishing its general headquarters there. The chapel is a brick and block structure seating about 200, and has been located in relation to other buildings to be constructed later. In addition the general gatherings to be held on the grounds, a regular Sunday school and church service is planned to be held in the chapel each Sunday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

Since 1935 the Reverend Andrews has edited the Full Salvation Union publication called The Union Guide, a sample copy of which can be had free by anyone who asks for it.

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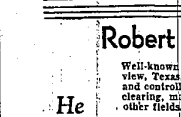

Local Jehovah's Witnesses Off To District Meet

A contingent of 150 Jehovah's Witnesses are attending a district assembly sponsored by the Watchtower Society which opened July 21 and will continue through July 21 at Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

One of ten similar gatherings this summer in the United States and Canada, will attract some 35,000 delegates according to Mr. Ludwig, 2220 Orchard Lake Road, local spokesman for the group.

"Conventions like this," said Mr. Ludwig, "are always a high point in the lives of Jehovah's Witnesses. Not only is there an opportunity to renew acquaintances—delegates will attend from at least 26 states as well as Canada—more important are receive instruction in Christian living and encouraging information on Bible prophecy that helps us keep our ministry practical and timely."

According to Mr. Ludwig, the mid-July gathering is being held in Milwaukee's County Stadium, the home of the Milwaukee Braves. For the five days a flower-decked platform will dominate the infield and the singing of 35,000 voices will replace the cheers of big-league baseball fans.

Appearing on the program from Watchtower world headquarters in Brooklyn is President N.H. Knorr and Mr. Franz have recently completed a tour of the East which took them to many current trouble spots. They will report on progress of missionary activity of the Witnesses.

"Highlight of the program," Mr. Ludwig advised, "will come Sunday, July 21, when Mr. Knorr discusses 'Healing of the Nations Has Drawn Near.'"
