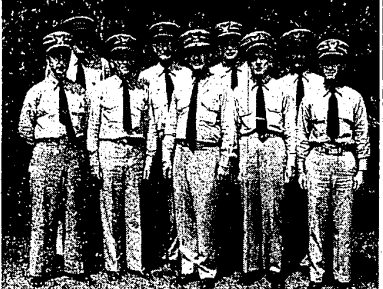

Gets Coast Guard Officer Training

For the first time the U. S. Coast Guard is operating a Reserve Officers Command School at the Coast Guard Academy, New London, Connecticut. One of the 42 Reserve Commanding and Executive Officers attending the first class from organized reserve training units through out the country East of the Mississippi River was Lt. James Watt of 30855 Springland Drive.

As their annual two weeks tour of active duty, the officers underwent a comprehensive course of study in all phases of command responsibility. Subjects ranging from geo-politics, guided missiles, atomic and cold warfare to the more prosaic and ever-present paper work required for the daily administration of the training units.

Establishment of the school is a part of the extensive program of the Coast Guard to build up its Reserve forces to mobilization strength.

For the first time in years, it may be the last moment before either party knows who will carry its standard in the 1958—or the 1960—election.

FARMERS WHOSE CROPS were damaged in the heavy storms during the first two weeks in July are getting relief.

The Farmers Home Administration has asked that 12 counties in central and southeastern Michigan be designated to receive emergency production loans at a low interest rate.

The loans will be made to individual farmers after they make their application through a county committee to the state office in Lansing.

Stories came in from the affected counties to a state conference of federal, state and local officials, telling of the damage of the storms and heavy rains.

They told of up to 70 per cent of the bean crop wiped out, 50 per cent of the hay in many counties, oats, barley, corn and hay were all damaged.

G. Elwood Bonine, state director of the Federal agency, said most of the loans would be sought in the fall or next spring, when the full effects of the summer's losses would be felt financially.
