Steering Committee Of New Lutheran Church Being Organized Meets

The early part of this month a steering committee of the new United Lutheran Church, being organized in the Farmington area, met in the congregation's parsonage at 2825 Grand River.

The men who were chosen to serve on this committee by Pastor James E. Henneberger, United Lutheran mission developer, were: John Robert Mitchell, Gordon Stout, Donald Schmiking, John Starkey, Charles Thomas, and Milton Jones.

At the initial meeting of the steering committee, which acts as a temporary Church Council until the congregation organizes and elects its own Pastor Henneberger reviewed with the men a proposed program of Sunday services and Sunday Church School for the coming year.

Services and Church School are planned to begin in the Fall in the new D. E. Dunckel Junior High School on Twelve Mile Road and Orchard Lake Road.

It was reported to the committee that already 35 families have shown definite interest in the new Lutheran congregation and that over 50 others have asked the pastor to return for further discussion about the United Lutheran Church in America and its new local congregation.

A very significant item discussed at the meeting was that of a name for the infant congregation. The name "Antioch Evangelical Lutheran Church" was adopted, the significance being that "in Antioch the disciples were for the first time called Christians." In Acts 11:26, one can read in the eleventh chapter of Acts about the beginning of the first mission congregation in the history of the Christian Church which was at the town of Antioch north of Palestine.

Give Pre-School Tips To Parents, Area Motorists

Last year 2,650 youngsters from five years of age to 14 lost their lives in accidents on our nation's highways, warns a leading national insurance company.

Along with getting those "first day clothes" ready it is urged that every parent consider rehearsing the children on safety rules and the best route to take to reach school in the safest possible manner.

Especially important is getting the youngster who is entering the school in the fall to "stop, look and listen."

"Instill in the child a healthy respect for the traffic officer or school patrol, advise the children to wait for the green light, and if they have moved into a new neighborhood and the children are attending a new school, this 'dress rehearsal' is most important."

Drivers should be alert at the re-opening of school. Those living in a new place are urged to learn to watch for areas where children wait for the school bus, the playgrounds and other places where youngsters congregate. Get to know these "slow down" spots.

If the motorist will review his driving route and parents spend a few minutes going over the basic safety rules with their children, needless tragedies may be prevented.


The conference members heard Robert Iglehart, U-M professor of art and chairman of the Department of Art, speak on "The Artist's Response to the Community."
