Propose Evening Investment Class

Clarencville School officials indicated that an evening class under the adult education program may be offered this year for persons interested in learning something about the stock market and investment program if enough can be enrolled to warrant the course.

Officials stated that an instructor in this field has been tentatively arranged for and the class will be given if initial interested expressed carries through with sufficient enrollments.

A man having stock brokerage background and four years of successful teaching experience in conducting such classes in neighboring communities including Detroit, has consented to come to Clarencville in September. He will supply the necessary source materials, school officials said.

He plans full coverage of the field including: the language of investing, theories of the past and present, plans for personal investment programs, reading and understanding a financial statement and market reports, charting individual company stock prices, how to investigate a company's financial structure with an actual example of a Detroit firm to illustrate the process, how the market operates, what causes daily and annual ups and down, procedures for buying and selling, as well as professional methods of planned buying and selling.

Persons having an interest in such a course being scheduled are requested to contact the Clarencville Board of Education Office. A letter is preferred giving ones name, address and telephone number. Fee will be somewhat dependent on size of enrollment, officials said, but is expected to be very reasonable and comparable to the usual adult education course charge.
