Co-Op Nursery Planning Two Sessions This Fall

The Mayfair Cooperative Nursery announces this week that it will begin having two separate sessions starting this fall.

Officials stated that this is a reflection of the steady growth of the only cooperative nursery in this area and is being undertaken because of the increasing demand for enrollment. Beginning September 10, a three-day-a-week session on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays will be started and a two-day-a-week session on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

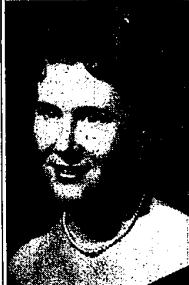
With two sessions, officials stated, the nursery school will be able to accommodate 40 3- to 5-year-old children instead of the previous 20.

A licensed nursery school teacher will be on duty, plus three assisting mothers. Each session will run from 9:15 to 11:45 a.m.

The cooperative is licensed by the Children's Division of the State Welfare Department and is now entering its third year of operation. Due to the cooperation of Trinity Church Farmington, the co-op will again be housed in the church, located at the end of Linneus Road, one-half mile north of Eleven Mile Road between Orchard Lake and Middlebelt Roads.

An orientation and get-acquainted meeting was held at the church last Tuesday evening, attended by the parents on the enrollment list, to prepare them for the opening of school.
