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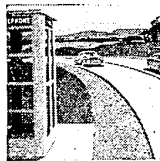
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VACATION BOUND?

Attends Reading Instruction Class

From this group may develop the balance of power—in years to come—sufficient to turn the economy back toward freedom.

Banking Next Target
Terje Kokaas, director of the Federation of Norwegian Commercial Associations and one of Norway's top legal minds (this organization represents the retail and wholesale merchants and jobbing agents of the nation). He told me: "The Marshall aid money sent by the U.S.A. to Norway helped momentarily but after that it propped up a Socialist government and perhaps was the deciding factor in keeping it in power. With their 'indirect controls' and pressures, the Socialist government leaders are building up Socialism obliquely."

Elliv Due, Director of Christiania Bank og Kreditkasse, Norway's foremost banking house. He said: "If the Socialists maintain full control of the Government in the October elections they will begin serious preparations to take over the banks. If they increase their strength they are almost certain to do so. With banking in their hands they can gain control of the basic life functions of the Norwegian nation."

Future Uncertain
Other Conservative leaders are a bit more optimistic than are these three men. Space does not permit recording some of their thinking, or the substance of my interview with Arne Skaug, Socialist Minister of Commerce in Norway's government, or those with people of other shades of political opinion.

I've seen and heard enough in Norway to develop a fondness for and feel a kinship with the people. They deserve a better break than Socialism is now giving them or will ever give them. From now until they return to the freedom and self-reliance of their great forebears, or sink inescapably into the mire of Socialism, my prayers will be with them.

Upon completion of training new Marines are assigned to a unit for further infantry training, or to one of the many Marine Corps schools.

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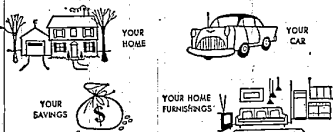

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF CLARENCEVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Special Election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid school district will be held in the Clarenceville High School located at 20210 Middlebelt Road in said school district on Monday, September 16, 1957, and at such Special Election the following propositions will be submitted to the qualified electors of the school district.

PROPOSITION I. DISPOSITION OF PROPERTY

"Shall Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, State of Michigan, sell, or exchange for other lands needed by said School District, or otherwise dispose of, for value, lands not needed for school purposes and described as: That part of the Southeast 1/4 of Section 1, Town 1 South, Range 9 East, Wayne (City of Livonia) County, Michigan, commencing from the center 1/4 corner of Section 1, and continuing thence South 1 degree 38 minutes 51 seconds East along the North and South 1/4 line of said Section 101.03 feet to the point of beginning; thence North 88 degrees 28 minutes 35 seconds East 300.0 feet; thence South 1 degree 38 minutes 51 seconds East 63.35 feet; thence South 88 degrees 27 minutes 50 seconds West 300.0 feet; to the North and South 1/4 section line; thence North 1 degree 38 minutes 35 seconds West 61.97 feet to the point of beginning, being 0.43 acres, more or less?"

PROPOSITION II. TRANSFER OF FUNDS

"Shall Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, State of Michigan, transfer the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) from its 1956 Building, Site, and Equipment Fund to its 1952 Building, Site, and Equipment Fund?"

The polls of election will be open from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 8:00 o'clock P.M. Eastern Standard Time.

Only registered voters are eligible to vote.

Each person voting on the propositions on Disposition of Property and Transfer of Funds must be a citizen of the United States, above age of twenty-one (21) years, have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months and in the school district thirty (30) days next preceding the day of election.
