### Call For Falcon Gridders Issued

Initial call for Farmington High varsity and junior varsity football players has been issued for this Thursday, August 29. A total of 97 prospective candidates have been invited out for opening drills and instruction given by their new coaches to the community would also be welcomed. Physical checkups will be given this morning, Thursday, at the Farmington High gymnasium. ### Plan Big Holiday Racing Program

An extra-special bonus is to be given visitors to the Detroit Race Course, Scholastic and Middle School, over the Labor Day holiday, officials said. Four big events are scheduled, starting with the Saturday, August 31, running of the \$10,000-added Col. F. M. Alger Memorial Handicap, a six-furlong sprint for three-year-olds and up. It will be the twenty-third running of the race. Labor Day track-goers will see the fourth running of the \$15,000-added one mile and one-sixteenth mile Wolverines Stakes, a middle distance race for three-year-olds. Tuesday, September 3, is Open House Day and the official start of the Detroit Race Course's 100th Anniversary Derby, which will be held each Tuesday of the month. Weekly winners of this year's Derby will receive a trip to either Havana, Nassau, Miami Beach or New York. Grand prize in the contest is a 17-day all-expense European tour for two, plus \$500 cash and a \$1,000 wardrobe from Harry Saffrin, Detroit clothier. The winner of the first Tuesday contest will be the guest of the Detroit Race Course at New York City, via Capital Air Lines, where he and his guest will tour the city in a royal fashion while staying at the beautiful Biltmore Hotel. Derby entry tickets will be found in the racing program each contest day with the deadline for entries set for five minutes before the start of the second race that day. The \$5,000-added Michigan Futurity is planned for September 4, making race horse fans to enjoy four thrill-packed days this Labor Day season. Post time is 2 p.m. Saturday and Labor Day with a 3:45 p.m. post time week days.

Many plastic articles are used merely for ornamental purposes. They usually have lustrous, bright, smooth surfaces and must be handled and cared for to prevent scratches which might mar the surfaces. If scratches do appear, however, you can restore the luster by rubbing with a wax polish and a soft clean cloth. Sometimes, just cleaning with a damp cloth and mild soap and water will do the job. Avoid using any cleaning substances containing a solvent or abrasive that might attack the plastic further. You may also cause scratches by using a soiled cloth for polishing or dusting.
