CUCUMBERS

Always pick cucumbers that have bright green color, that are firm, smooth-skinned and fairly straight. Avoid any that are soft or have a yellow skin.

Once good quality "cukes" have been picked, store them in the refrigerator in a covered container. They lose flavor and crispness at warm temperatures. To enjoy their best flavor, use cucumbers within three days.

**Bean Sandwich
Ideas Offered**

Although a titled Englishman is credited with originating this "bread with a filling", the sandwich is a typical American standard. Generally little known but immensely popular with all who try it is the sandwich using the canned variety or leftover home baked beans.

Here are three delicious versions.

Partially split five frankfurters lengthwise and place each on a bun. Fill each frank with heated baked beans. Cover with a slice of sharp cheese; bake in moderate oven till cheese melts. Serve hot, garnished with green onions for a real home sandwich.

Melt 2 tablespoons of butter in a saucepan, add 2 cups mashed beans, and stir over the heat for 5 minutes. Add about 1 cup of milk, 1 cup of grated American cheese, salt and pepper to taste. Cook till cheese is melted, stirring constantly. Serve on bread or toast, topping each with watercress, sliced tomatoes or onion.

Mash 1 cup of drained, canned Boston-style beans well. Blend in 1/4 cup finely diced pickles, 2 minced hard cooked eggs, 2 tablespoons catsup, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard and 1 tablespoon grated onion. Spread generously on pumpkinseed or rye bread.

**The Handyman's
NOTEBOOK**

DON'T WRECK THAT REC. ROOM!

Okay, so you've got your basement recreation room finished — at least all the basic work.

And now the Little Woman has discovered a bit of mildew on something down there — maybe on something that you've stored in a drawer or closet.

So what next? Rip out the basement room? Get a divorce? No! Turn back, man, fight back! No, no, no, against your wife! Against the mildew!

And you can do it, too, and what's more it's quite possible, in this day and age, to rid yourself of any mildew problems in the future.

Mildew is simply a whitish discoloration that often occurs on objects exposed to too much moist air, usually in an enclosed space.

Snap and water will often remove it, and if that fails, rub the object with laundry soap and cover it with starch. If it's an object on which you can safely use bleach, then try it. Otherwise, apply lemon juice or vinegar and let the object dry in sunlight.

If the mildew shows up on a painted surface, remove the paint, wash the wood with bleach and repaint it.

There are several different ways of preventing mildew from recurring. Some paints have a "built in" mildewicide, or you can add a little yourself to any paint you want to use. Leather goods, such as shoes and luggage, can be protected by a coating of shoe polish or wax into which you have mixed a little bit of fungicide.

*You can also protect a whole area with any one of several gadgets and compounds which basically do the same thing — remove excess moisture from the air. If you use them sensibly, they are likely to continue producing conditions that cause mildew, you'd be wise to consider investing in one of these.

And, speaking of investments, you can save time, effort and money by painting any concrete floor to cut down on dust. Next time you're near your store, drop in and ask us about it.
