Says Lawn Mulch Smothers Grass

A mulch on a lawn often causes severe injury by smothering the grass. One should not put branches, leaves, or straw on the lawn for winter protection, advises James Tyson, soil scientist at Michigan State University.

The mulch is especially harmful in the case of shade-tolerant grasses under trees. It is a good practice to remove all the leaves and rubbish from the lawn before it is covered with snow.

Tyson says, one should set the lawn mower down to cut the grass at about half an inch, once either late in the fall or early in the spring and remove all the dead grass by using the catcher or raking the lawn after mowing.
