Consideration has been, and is being given, to the need for additional facilities in the near future.

Financially, the position of the district is sound. The reserve of \$65,000.00 in the 1957-58 Debt Fund was established by 1956. The 1956 Debt Fund will be self-sustaining within one year. The General Fund receipts were approximately \$17,000.00 less than anticipated. This was due to a decrease in State Aid.

Study and research must be done to continue to provide the best possible program for the children. One of the areas of major study of the 1957-58 year will be in the field of Science.

By consideration of our instructional needs in terms of a changing society, we will endeavor to maintain the type of program the district can and will provide for the children.

Committee chairmen include Delia Hamlin, finance; Filzburgh Prescott, program; Terrence Brennan, publicity and Stanley Thorpe, legislative. Edward Moseman will serve as parliamentarian.
