

## Paint Brush Cleaning Tips Given

Cleaning brushes used for the new latex paints is a tough job but can be made easier if done right after painting before the paint has a chance to set and dry, say authorities.

B. F. Cargill, agricultural engineer at Michigan State University, recommends the following method: First, flush the paint out of the brush with water; then thoroughly clean it with water and a modern kitchen detergent. Rinse it in clear water again, comb, shape and hang it up to dry. If the paint has set and dried in the heel of the brush or on the surface of the bristles it is necessary to use a solvent.

For butadiene-styrene and acrylic types of latex paint, use benzol-alcohol-acetate type paint and varnish remover, Cargill recommends. For polyvinyl acetate latex paints not completely hardened, methyl alcohol is the most effective solvent, but one can also use the above type of paint remover. If the same type of paint is in gummy condition use denatured alcohol.

## "Sweetest Day" Set For Oct. 19

"Sweetest Day"—a day of neighborliness and appreciation will be observed here on Saturday, October 19. Traditionally "Sweetest Day" is observed throughout the nation on the third Saturday of October.

"Sweetest Day" originated in Cleveland more than 30 years ago when a benevolent resident of that city, believing that the city's orphan and shut-out were too often forgotten or neglected, conceived the idea of showing them they were remembered by the distribution of small gifts. In time the idea spread to other parts of the country, including the Detroit area, and it has come to be an occasion which offers an opportunity to remember not only the sick, the aged and orphaned but also to recognize kindnesses of friends, relatives and associates.

"Sweetest Day" is not based on any single group's religious sentiment or on a family relationship, but is a reminder that a thoughtful word or deed enriches life and gives it meaning, it was pointed out.

Plans for observance of "Sweetest Day" in the Detroit area are now being formulated. They include distribution of gifts to children in institutions, the honoring of persons who have performed the most outstanding deeds of service in their community during the year.

## Goodwill Plans Saturday Pickups

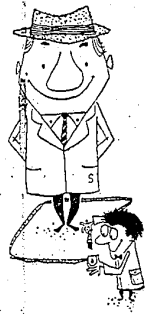
Goodwill Industries announced this week that beginning Saturday, September 28, they will send trucks into Farmington and Livonia the second and fourth Saturdays of each month.

There were 450 persons per square mile in Oakland County in 1950, and estimates indicate that this density increased to 560 in 1954, according to the Oakland County Planning Commission.

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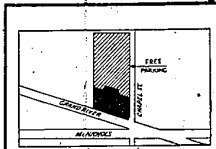

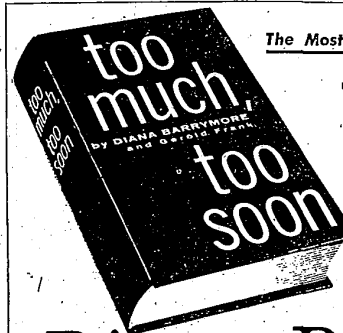
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
