One Out Of Three Korean Veterans Make Use Of GI Bill Training, VA Says

The Korean GI Bill, a law which has given nearly 2,000,000 Korea veterans a chance to further their education, is five years old in August.

Mr. Jameson, manager of the VA regional office in Detroit, reported recently that one out of every three of Michigan's 200,000 Korea veterans have availed themselves of GI training to date.

More than half of the Korean GI trainees in Michigan, or nearly 37,000 have gone to college. One third, or more than 21,000, attended schools below the college level, such as trade and business institutions. The rest took their training on-the-job and on-the-farm.

All together, 64,910 Korea Veterans thus far have received 682,387 months of GI training — at an average of nearly one year apiece. This average will go up, Mr. Jameson said, since thousands of veterans have not yet completed their courses.

Because of the Korean GI Bill, the veteran still is very much a part of the Michigan college campus. Mr. Jameson said. One-quarter of all male college students are veterans.

Leader Dogs for the Blind, a Torch Drive service, offers four-week courses for training the blind in use of a Leader Dog. It qualified blind persons between the ages of 18 and 55. As a result of the course, eight years of freedom from travel dependence can be expected.
