**Named Southwest Oakland Torch Drive Chairman**

James L. Crow, industrial relations manager at the Lincoln assembly plant in Wisom, has been named general vice chairman of the United Ford's Torch Drive for southwestern Oakland County.

This marks the first time the Torch Drive is to be conducted by the United Foundation of Metropolitan Detroit in these Oakland County townships. Organizations previously campaigning under the Twenty-Township Fund or independently in this region will receive money raised in the drive.

"The enthusiasm already generated by the volunteers out here in conjunction with the aid given by the United Foundation staff of Metropolitan Detroit should make this a record year of giving by the industries and people of our region," Mr. Crow said.

Funds raised in the Torch Drive this fall will be used to finance 1.95 health and community services, including the Southeastern Michigan quotas of such widely-spread organizations as the American Red Cross, the Michigan Heart Society, and the American Cancer Society. Last year, \$16,225, 000 was raised.

For those unable to deliver their contributions, special pick-ups are being arranged by Mrs. Dan Guy, GR 4-1432, and Eugene McAdams, GR 4-6983.

For the most part, items to be sold should be clean and in good repair and clothing sizes marked when possible. However, there are several exceptions to this rule — radios and clocks need not be in working order. The ever-growing interest in homemade rugs creates a good market for women material, such as worn-out suits and trousers, wool bathrobes, out-dated coats and even wool blankets, etc.

Mrs. Leonard Stidwell, W.S.C.S. President, and Mrs. V. O. Bates, Treasurer, report that the profit from the Rummage Sale, will be added to the kitchen equipment fund being raised by the Woman's Society of the church. As the work progresses on the new educational unit of the church, the ladies are invited to see their new kitchen progress too.

Due to the fact that my office has been deluged by telephone calls, because of some misunderstanding on the part of Farmington Township residents who are availing themselves of the township-wide monthly trash, or rubbish, collection for the first time, I feel that some clarification is presently in order.

In the event that you are one of the unfortunate ones whose trash was not picked up in August or September, it may have been for one or more of the following reasons:

1. Container too large or too heavy for handling without special equipment.
2. Garbage in rubbish.
3. Ashes in rubbish.
4. Trash on ground and not in suitable receptacle.
5. Combustible matter in rubbish, such as paper, grass cuttings, etc.

I ask your cooperation in abiding by the above regulations, in order that our Sanitation Service may function more efficiently and thus extend better service to each and every resident of the Township.
