Livonia Couple Tours Canada With Caravan

Mr. and Mrs. Donald Game, 31850 Six Mile Road, Livonia, were among the 368 travel-trailer families touring Canada's eastern provinces with the Wally Byam Eastern Canada Caravan.

The Wally Byam Caravan led its state-side rendezvous point at Skowhegan, Me. July 10 to spend approximately six weeks visiting Canadian centers of interest. These included Amhurst, Prince Edward Island, Windsor, Yarmouth, Lunenburg, Halifax, Baddeck, points along the picturesque Cabot Trail, Newfoundland, Shediac, the Gaspé Peninsula, Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa. The Caravan disbanded in Canada Aug. 15.

Most of the Wally Byam Caravanners arrived at their rendezvous after attending the New York World's Fair and their own history-making Seventh International Rally of the Wally Byam Caravan Club near Princeton, N.J. June 22 to July 5. A total of 2015 Airstream travel trailers gathered for that event, the largest number in trailing history.

As the Eastern Canadian Caravan made its way along its route an approximately simultaneous "Wally Byam International Caravan" visited points of historical interest, especially of the Revolutionary and Civil War periods, in Pennsylvania and Virginia.

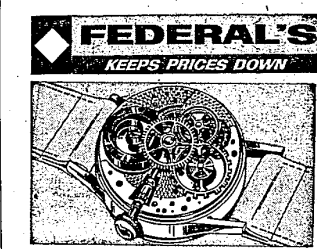
Meanwhile, another group of Wally Byam Caravanners in 44 travel trailers were in Europe on the final segment of their history-making journey around the world. The Wally Byam Around the World Caravan left Los Angeles in September, 1952 and will disband this October, after visiting the Soviet Union.

Robert Smith of Lees Summit, Mo., veteran Caravanner and a former president of the

Wally Byam Caravan Club, led the 368 travel trailers of the Canadian Caravan. He heads a group of trailblazers representing virtually every state in the Union, including Hawaii and Alaska, as well as several Canadian trailer families who toured their own country.

The Caravan organized itself into a mobile trailer "city" of about 100 persons during its rendezvous period at Skowhegan, Me. Various committees were formed to handle such enroute functions as parking, supplies, security, mail and clean-up. Meanwhile, the Caravan staff provided by the manufacturer of the trailers, Airstream, Inc., cleared away all customs and insurance work.

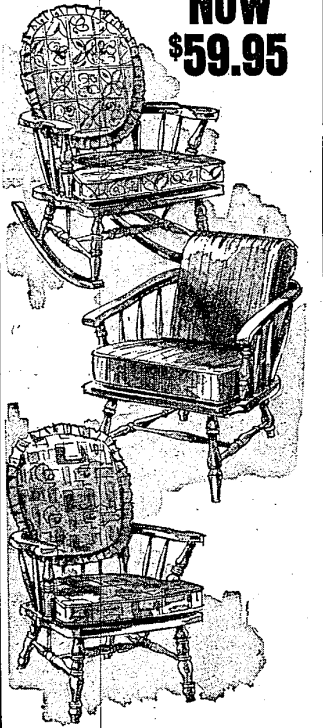

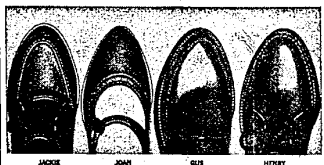
