AN ORDINANCE TO PROTECT THE GENERAL WELFARE OF THE CITZENS OF WHITE LAKE TOWNSHIP BY DESIGNATING THE MINIMUM APPAREL REQUIREMENTS FOR BATHING PUREOSES, AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION HEREOF.

The White Lake Township Board ordains as follows: SECTION 1. Definition.

(A) Public Beach is hereby defined to mean any premises where swimming is permitted in an open body of water or pool that is owned by a public body. (B) Private Beach is hereby defined to mean any premises where swimming is permitted in an open body of water or pool that is owned by an individual, partnership or private corporation to which admission is obtained for consideration and to which persons are permitted to attend without any prohibition as to age or sex.

SECTION 2. Minimum Apparel Requirements. All persons in attendance at a public or private beach, as herein defined, shall be attired in a garment made of an opaque fabric or material which completely covers all private parts of the body and in the case of females, over the age of 8, their breasts.

in the case or accommendation of the case of the court of competent jurisdiction of violating the above provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$10.00 and the costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the Oakland County Jall for a period not to exceed 93 days or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court.



Although the nomination in Michigan went to Mrs. Elly Peterson, voters in Farmington alone gave the edge to James O'Neil of Livonia in the G.O.P. race for US. Senate.

Farmington Township voted the race: O'Neil, 1,128; Mrs. Peterson, J.O.M. Edward Menny, 507.

City of Farmington voted: O'Neil, 550; Peterson, 223; Menny, 112.

Total vote cast in the State Primary Tuesday was 4,212 in the Township and 1,549 in the City — about 40 percent of the registered voters.
