

Clarenceville Will Put TV in Classrooms

All schools in the Clarenceville District will be equipped with educational television, the Board of Education determined last Thursday.

The action was taken following a detailed study of the needs and use of television as a

teaching device. Board members said in voting for the new program.

An organized program of educational television will begin in the District's four elementary schools and television will be added to the junior and senior high schools. Although there will be no organized program in the secondary schools, Board members said they felt items of national interest to adults and children would justify in-

stallation in the junior and senior high buildings.

At the present time, television is being used in Westbrook Elementary School.

From the report accepted by the Board, it was decided to place one television receiver in each building now. A mobile cart will be furnished and TV receiving antennas will be installed in at least three different parts of each school to make possible use of the TV program

in several areas of each building.

Outside antennae equipped to receive UHF and VHF signals will be mounted on each school and wired to provide high quality reception.

"While the cost of such a bargaining program as this was questioned by one member of the board," a school district statement said, "it was pointed out that in each case the individual school would be contributing toward the overall cost."

Through this combined expenditure, television will be available to pension operation, educational children in the Clarenceville District. Without this co-operation between school off-

icals and the public, the cost of such a program could make itself felt to such a degree as to greatly reduce or even eliminate educational television in our schools," the statement concluded.

In other action:

- The new location of a baseball field and softball field as well as eight tennis courts at the high school was approved.
- A resolution to join with South Lyon and Novi Community School Districts in the hiring of a school diagnostician was carried.
- The Westbrook Elementary School has now been connected

to the Farmington Township water supply.

- The Building Needs Study Committee announced a late October meeting to consider needs of the school district.
- The Livonia Women's Chorus and Brightmoor Church League receive permission to use schools in accordance with the Policies and Procedures of the school district.
- The Community School Program to receive continued study and development along with the City of Livonia and the Livonia Public Schools.
- The high school will host the Michigan State University Supervising Teachers on Thursday, October 29.

'Civil Rights Movement Part of World Struggle,' Johnson Tells Livonia Group

"Great and dramatic changes are taking place in our country in regard to the struggle of the Negro for freedom . . . and this is one aspect of the total freedom struggle in the world. It is tied to world-wide efforts for peace and for social justice, and it means a hope for the survival of our own values as a nation in the world."

This was the conviction expressed by Arthur Johnson Sunday evening at the November meeting of the Livonia Citizens for Better Human Relations at Rosedale Gardens Presbyterian Church. More than 80 people were present to see the ABC-TV documentary film, "Walk in My Shoes," which was followed by remarks from Mr. Johnson and general discussion from the floor. At the present time, Mr. Johnson is a deputy director of the State Civil Rights Commission. Formerly, he was the Executive Secretary for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Detroit.

U. of D. Talk on Philosophy

Dr. Anton Donoso, University of Detroit assistant professor of philosophy, will be the fourth speaker in the "Questions Disputatae."

This bi-weekly lecture series is sponsored by the U. of D. chapter of Phi Sigma Tau, national philosophy honor society.

The lecture will begin at 8:15 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 12 in the U. of D. Student Union Bldg.

Dr. Donoso has recently returned from the Catholic University of Cordoba in Argentina where he taught advanced courses in philosophy.

The lecture will illustrate in general how the various ways of philosophies of life in North America are reflected in the various philosophies formed or accepted by contemporary North Americans. He will demonstrate in particular that the North American way of life is not materialism, and that the North American philosophy is not pragmatism.

Dr. Donoso received his doctoral degree in philosophy at the University of Toronto, specializing in contemporary North American philosophy, and the philosophy of history. He has written articles for the "University of Detroit Law Journal," "Law Journal of the University of Puerto Rico," and "Vanderbilt Law Review."
