## Guides For Cooking That Thanksgiving Bird

Thanksgiving traditionally means a turkey on the table and in the modern supermarket there are many shapes and sizes to choose from.

When choosing the right size turkey for your dinner Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Home Economists recommend you allow approximately 1/2 to 3/4 pounds per person.

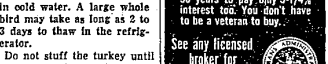
Unstuffed turkeys and turkey parts should be almost completely thawed before cooking. Do not thaw commercially frozen stuffed birds before cooking. The refrigerator is the best place to thaw. Unwrap small parts and separate them so air can reach each piece. To shorten the time, turkeys sealed in water-tight wrappers may be thawed in cold water. A large whole bird may take as long as 2 to 3 days to thaw in the refrigerator.

Do not stuff the turkey until time to roast it. Stuffing a turkey and refrigerating or freezing it at home for later use is not recommended by the Cooperative Extension Service Home Economists.

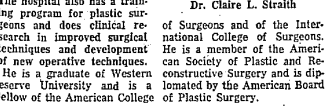
## Dr. Straith to Speak to Kendallwood Farms Women
