### Library Announces Dates for Popular Pre-School Story Hours

The library announced this week that the popular Pre-School Story Hours for 4 year olds will be resumed this fall, beginning Tuesday, October 6. This will be a regular event every Tuesday from 10:30-11 a.m., except on those Tuesdays when school is not in session.

The following figures from the annual report for the fiscal year July 1, 1963 - June 30, 1964, were also released: Circulation, 176,781 books; Total registered borrowers, 18,539; and Book Stock, 21,394.

The use of the library increases steadily. During the previous months of June, July, and August, 52,481 books were circulated. This represents 7,201 more books circulated than in the same period last year.

MANY OF OUR new books have been purchased with funds donated by local groups and individual funds given as gifts to the library or as memorials. These books all have book-plates in the fly leaves to designate them. All current new titles are listed bi-monthly and put in the folder on the new book shelf.

At the moment the most popular books seem to be the new books on political science and the presidential candidates. This being a presidential year, there have been a number of excellent new titles on the political parties, voting procedures, etc., as well as on the candidates.
