After trailing Riverside 12-0 for two and a half quarters, North Farmington staged a fourth quarter comeback to down the Rebels 13-12.

The Raiders drew first blood when center Jim Falch recovered a fumbled punt attempt in the end zone for a touchdown. TOM TRAUSCH kicked the extra point and North Farmington led 7-0 with only two min-

utes gone. Other than that there were no other highlights in the first half, one of the worst games ever played by a North Farmington squad. In the second quarter, Riverside crossed the goal-line twice to take the lead at halftime, 12-7.

The second half was a completely different ball game as North Farmington completely out-

THREE TIMES the Raiders drove to within the 5-yard line but were unable to score.

With two minutes to play, John McDonald caught a pass from quarterback Bill Olszewski and moved the ball to the Riverside 40-yard line.

CRAIG CARPENTER then carried the ball 5 plays in 12 seconds to move the ball to the two-yard line.

BOB LINDERMAN then carried the ball off-tackle for the winning touchdown. Riverside had the ball at mid-field when the gun ended the game with NF a one-point victor, 13-12.

The victory raised North Farmington's season record to 2 wins and 0 losses, but dangers on the horizon with the Detroit Northern Eskimos traveling to North Farmington Friday afternoon at 3:30 p.m.

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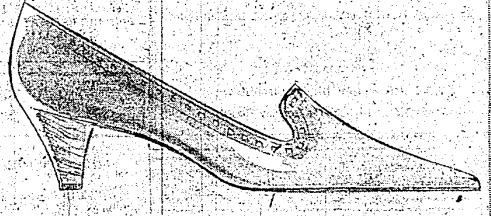


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Lancers Bow to St. Agatha In First Grid Loss, 30-7

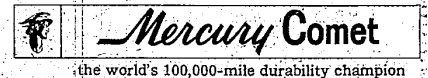
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
