UF Residential Goal Set at \$13,892 for '65
The Torch Drive quota from residential area solicitations for this year in Farmington City and Township has been set at \$13,892.74. As in the past, a house of 1000 sq. ft. or more in the entire area will be made by women volunteers between October 20 and Oct. 30. Immediate plans if the project receives final approval from the Township Board, call for the construction of the motel which will have 200 guest units, a restaurant, tennis courts, and a swimming pool with a slide-away translucent roof; and the building of the 200-acre tract, with the construction of only 200 of the apartment units. The balance of the apartments will be put up on a planned program over several years, the developers stated.

Complaints were registered by parents who reported that they had observed gravel-laden trucks turning into Kendallwood Subdivision at a high rate of speed and endangering students walking to and from school. The Board instructed School Administrators to write a letter to the Township Police Department requesting that they give more attention to the control of traffic on Twelve Mile Road between Orchard Lake and Farmington Roads, particularly during school hours.
