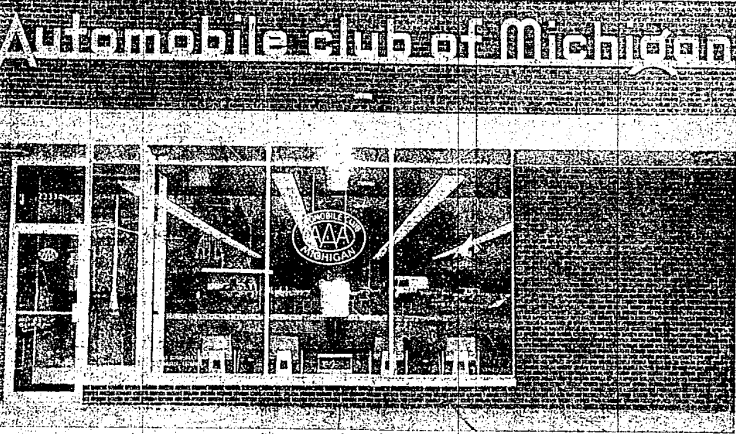
During the course Meacham received instruction in the operation of Army airfields and in the maintenance of Army aircraft.

He was graduated from Farmington High School in 1964.

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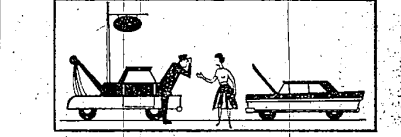
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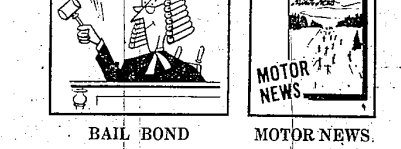
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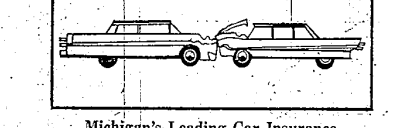
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
