Plan Town Hall Lecture Nov. 19

Northville Town Hall welcomes Baronesse Von Trapp on November 19 to the lecture, "The World With The Trapp Family Singers," is known all over the world as a story of how young Maria, a novitiate in Austria, was loaned by the Abbey to the Salzburg household of one World War Naval hero, widower Baron von Trapp as governess for his seven motherless children. All this, of course, served as the basis for Rodgers and Hammerstein musical, "The Sound of Music." Starting at 8:00 p.m. Baronesse Von Trapp, Father (now Monsignor) and the 10 Trapp children became the Trapp Family Singers, appearing in their colorful costumes of their native Tyrol. The group toured the world for 20 years, winning acclaim in more than 2,000 concerts throughout the U.S., Australia and New Zealand. Rodgers and Hammerstein's musical, "The Sound of Music," has been married and scattered around the world. Two daughters are lay missionaries in New Guinea, three others are housewives, another works with a Catholic youth organization in Honolulu and another operates a kindergarten. Thus far, there is an aggregate of 25 Trapp grandchildren.

Reflecting a collector's tastes, the mellow atmosphere of Mrs. Brunk's home, highlighted with charming pieces of colorful native glass and handmade pottery chests, seemed an appropriate background for her comments as well as the showing of numerous old books and school texts, some family books of knowledge and entertainment and others of varied subject matter. Most were printed in quaint, obsolete style with interesting illustrations. Access to these books was made possible through the courtesy of Mrs. Gene Goldmeister, the former Viola Owen, whose family owned and operated Farmington's early hotel, once located where the city parking lot is now. 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
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
