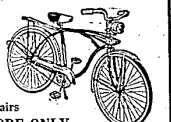

# FHS Eleven Blanks Southfield

## Falcons Clash With Raiders In Grid Showdown Saturday

The Farmington High School football team scored its fifth victory of the fall campaign, blanking the Southfield eleven 16-0, on the Falcon gridiron last Friday afternoon.

In tuning up for their season finale this Saturday afternoon at North Farmington High School, the Falcons rolled for 186 yards on the ground and 45 yards through the air to net seven first downs and two touchdowns. A 25-yard field-goal starter against North Farmington.

Also on the Falcon injury list are Dick Johnson, Roy Leach and Dana Esser, all injured with Mitchell in the Southfield game. Leach's injury was an aggravated from earlier in the season, a bad ankle. Esser suffered a knee injury and Johnson a bad ankle.

ADDING TO FALCON coach Jack Hayes' problems are players who were lost to the team earlier in the season and still out of action, Ron Cleveland and Dan Klawender. Reserve tackle Bill Cretcher also turned up with an injury this week as he was hurt in a physical education class.

One promising development which came out of last week's clash with Southfield was the fine job turned in by defensive linemen Carl Mitch, Dick Isbell and Lardie. All saw double duty with the Falcon's offensive backfield and turned in creditable performances.

JERRY TINKLE, a sophomore end for Farmington, will be seeing more duty in the big finale at North Farmington this Saturday. Coach Hayes, who has been using Tinkle on kick-offs and on defense, is now down to just three players to man the end positions.

In the game statistics, Farmington fumbled three times and recovered their own fumble on each occasion while Southfield gave up the ball five times on seven fumbles. Both teams were even in penalties, each receiving three for 35 yards.

WAYNE JOHNSTON's punting gave Farmington another at the stubbarn Bluejay line. Falcon halfback Ray Lardie scored the final touchdown of the game with just seconds left to play on a 20-yard end sweep. Lardie, who is a regular line-backer on the Falcon defensive unit, carried the ball seven times during the game to net 44 yards.

ERUCE CHARLES, senior halfback for Farmington and son of the Southfield coach, Monty Charles, proved once again to be a Bluejay nemesis. Charles was the game's leading ground gainer. He ran for a total of 57 yards in ten carries and also proved troublesome to Southfield in returning Bluejay kicks for good yardage.

Farmington attempted ten passes and completed three.

## Farmington's Bantams Blank Southfield Jayhawks, 13-0

The Rocket Bantams of the Farmington Junior Football Association closed out their 1964 schedule with a 13-0 triumph over the Southfield Jayhawks and the Bantams wishing to add an insurance touchdown.

The Jayhawks kicked off. It was a low line drive kick-off to Sean Harte who fumbled the ball momentarily but picked it up and just as he was about to be smothered by three or four Southfield players somehow managed to hand the ball to Kenny Haller who sprinted 63 yards for a quick Rocket touchdown.

The extra point attempt was missed and the score became 13 to 0. No further scoring was made and this ended the game and season for the Rocket Bantams.
