

## Announce Plans for New 1964 County Census of Agriculture

Plans for taking the 1964 county census of agriculture in Oakland County were announced recently by Lorenz B. Perkins, newly-appointed census crew leader for the county.

The job will be done in three stages, the crew leader said. First will come recruitment and training of enumerators to count all farms in the county. About one enumerator for each 150 farms will be needed.

Shortly after November 5, the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce, will start the second stage by mailing agricultural census questionnaires to all rural boxholders in the county. This will give farm and ranch operators a period of time to fill out the forms, a period of time to consult their records and fill in answers to the questions.

In the final stage, enumerators will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit,

## Low-Income Tax Break Set

About 1.5 million low-income taxpayers will have no tax to pay next year because of the new minimum standard deduction provision enacted this year.

Mr. Nixon said that for a married couple with no additional exemptions filing a joint return there will be no tax to pay until their income reaches \$1,000. Previously these couples had to pay tax on income \$125 less than the new amount.

The new minimum standard deduction amounts to \$200 for a single person and for a married couple filing jointly plus \$100 for each allowable exemption up to a ceiling of \$1,000. For a married person filing a separate return, the deduction amounts to \$100 plus \$100 for each allowable exemption up to a ceiling of \$500.

Taxpayers who do not stymie deductions must use this minimum deduction if it exceeds the 10 percent standard deduction.

Tax savings at this new provision are expected to amount to about \$20 million. Approximately 13 million taxpayers who earn less than \$10,000 a year will benefit.
