

# Farmington - North Farmington Gridders Clash To End 1964 Grid Season, 0-0



The third annual gridiron clash between Farmington and North Farmington ended in a scoreless tie for the first time, in addition to the game trophy which was at stake in the rivalry, the winner was to have received a trophy log inscribed with the score of the contest to be attached to a plaque presented to the schools by the Farmington Board of Commerce which promoted this first "Oldie Yule Log" benefit game.

WITH THE OUTCOME of the game ending as it did, both schools will get a log for their plaque to start things off in the annual gridiron competition, in Farmington 0, North Farmington 0.

The traveling trophy will remain with the Raiders who were the first to win it in the opening contest between the two schools back in 1962, 7-0, and retained it last season by taking a 18-6 decision from Farmington.

A defensive battle all the way, North Farmington could not find the combination needed to dent the Farmington goal line and the Falcons continually

had their drives thwarted by penalties, fumbles and interceptions.

The Raider "Chain Gang" recovered both of Farmington's fumbles and intercepted three Falcon penalties. The rest of the game was a series of walkoffs for a total of 45 yards compared to just two carries thrown against the Raiders, both five yard penalties.

COACH JACK HAYES had good reason to be proud of his team as he watched the Farmington defense unit, as they checked the Raiders' repeatedly deep in Farmington territory. North Farmington succeeded in gaining only five first downs and were held to 108 yards total offense in the game.

The punting statistics told very well the over-all running of the game as Farmington's Wayne Johnston was called upon no less than seven times and Tom Trausch of the Raiders punted six times.

North Farmington's punt went for a total of 204 yards for an average net of 34 yards per kick. Johnston, who booted Farmington out of trouble on one occasion after fielding a bad pass from center which went over his head, averaged 38 yards per kick to give the Falcons a total of 255 yards in their seven punting plays.

THE FALCON'S BRUCE Charles brought the crowd to its feet when Trausch punted from the North Farmington 46 yard line and he returned it to the Raider 30. A costly clipping penalty placed Farmington back on the Raider 45 to partially nullify the 45-yard return by Charles.

Since there were only two kickoffs, the one that opened the game by Farmington and the second half boot by North Farmington, kick-off returns were scant statistics. The Falcons returned the opening second half kick for seven yards and the Raiders netted ten yards on their return of the opening kickoff.

RAIDER QUARTERBACK Bill Oldershaw supplied the biggest chunk of North Farmington's total yardage by connecting with John McDonald on a play that covered 30 yards to end the first half action. McDonald was forced out of play by the Raiders' Dick Johnston and Terry Nielsen at the Farmington one yard line.

The second half action featured a series of exchanges of ball possession and even ended on an interception. Ray Lardie of Farmington picked off an

but has a solid group of juniors, including both quarterbacks, Mike Wilson and Ron Cleveland, returning to the squad next year. Jerry Tinkle, a sophomore, and Dan Klavender are the only ends due back for Farmington. First string ends Terry Nielsen and Tom Mitchell will be lost through graduation along with backfield stars Leach, Johnston and Charles.

Farmington ended the season with a 5-3-1 record while North Farmington posted their finest season with a 7-1-1 mark.

Joe Stephan, a 230 pound senior, was chosen at right tackle. Stephan was a 48 minute man who played both offense and defense in all nine games. Many times he was the difference between victory and defeat for NF as his fine blocking led to many Raider touchdowns and outstanding defensive plays.

Two blocked punts led to successive North Farmington touchdowns. And before the Little Falcons knew what had happened they were down 13-7 as the final gun sounded.

THOSE CADETS who qualify in the Michigan Wing screening will win the following prizes: trips to foreign countries for three weeks, jet orientation flights of eight hours per person in a T-38 jet, trips to Europe, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Meade of Cadillac, Farmington, and squadron Commander of the Southfield group.

The Civil Air Patrol, an auxiliary of the United States Air Force, is open to teenagers 13-21 years of age. There are many opportunities to fly. The squadron for this area is the Birney Jr. High, 11500 14th Ave. Evergreen in Southfield.
