### Still Getting House Vibration

Siegfried Fleischmann of 22475 Violet St. appeared before the City Council Monday night for the second time to indicate that he was still experiencing strong vibrations in his home caused by machinery being operated in the Farmington Sheet Metal building on Orchard Lake Road.

Fleischmann informed the Council two weeks earlier of this problem and the city manager was instructed to check the matter out.

City Manager John Dinan told the Council that he had made a check and was led to believe that the vibrations were being caused as the result of large gas storage tanks being dropped into the ground across Orchard Lake Road a short distance to the south. He said he had looked over the machine in the sheet metal shop and did not see how the machine operation as demonstrated to him could cause bad vibrations.

He was instructed by the Council to check the matter again more thoroughly and take whatever corrective steps were necessary.

(Continued from Page 1-A) special assessment improvement. Neither the city manager or city attorney were certain on this point.

Instructs were given by the Council to get this point clarified and for the city manager to report back the next regular Council meeting.

DURING the course of the discussion, Ned Oglesby, representative of the Elks Club, questioned the interdependency of the exchange of the two buildings and a go ahead with the total parking improvement proposed. It was his feeling that the exchange of the two buildings and the rating of the Elks Temple by the city in itself would be beneficial even if the total parking improvement could not be made immediately.

Some councilmen appeared to agree with Oglesby on this point but did not express themselves firmly to this effect.

Councilman Forrest stated that it was his understanding when negotiations for the swap of the two buildings began several months back that the main reason for considering the exchange of the two buildings was so that the total parking area improvement could be made.

City councilmen were informed Monday night that the Checker Cab Co. of Livonia had now obtained use of the Goers Coal Yard office on Grand River Ave. across from the Farmington Plaza for a stand here.

The Council did feel, however, that it would be well to get a location in the downtown business section where cabs could be parked to pick up customers. The city manager and director of public safety were asked to select a location and reserve space for a couple of cabs to be parked in the downtown section.

(Continued from Page 1-A) THE ALREADY serious traffic congestion problem is likely to get substantially worse before improvements can be made.

Wayne County has definite plans already in the works for the widening of Farmington Road from Plymouth Road all the way to Eight Mile. With a four lane pavement north of Nine Mile already in and the widening of Farmington Road coming up through Livonia before the end of 1965, there will be serious traffic bottlenecks between Eight and Nine Mile where only a two lane wide road now exists.

No real answers to the problem were reached at the Council meeting Monday night. City Manager John Dinan was instructed by the councilmen, however, to make a check to determine whether a city would be in a financial position to sell bonds to finance its proportionate share of the cost for the proposed road widening over a 15 year period.

### Vandalism Topic At Meeting Held Last Week

A committee of school administrators, governmental officials and student representatives from the five secondary schools in the Farmington public school system met last week to discuss ways of combating juvenile vandalism in the Farmington community.

In attendance were G. V. Harrison, Supt. of schools; Earl Oppenheuser, attorney; and members of the Farmington Township Board; City Manager John Dinan; James Geiger, principal of Farmington High; Robert Brown, assistant principal at Dunckel Junior High; representing the schools; student body were Michael Messing, a senior, and Jim Schaefer, a junior, and Howard Broadhead, East Junior High student council president; and Mike Miller and Tony Waring, Farmington senior class representatives from THIS.

"Vandalism has turned out to be a big problem in our community and certainly needs to be controlled," City Manager Dinan commented.

Oppenheuser stated, "our problem is not so much the cost of repairing the damages as the principle of the thing. It will be much easier for youth to break the law when they're not liable because of their actions."

Dinan also pointed out that a wide range of age exists with vandals and it's a problem. Youth's money boys have been involved in vandalism cases in ages running all the way from 12 to 21, he said.

TO CORRECT a misstatement of unfortunate misunderstandings such as which were developed in connection with this project, the councilmen ordered that:

1. The city building inspector work closely with the planning commission in the future and attend all planning commission meetings and render technical knowledge assistance when it is needed. The city manager should familiarize himself better with the zoning ordinance and keep up-to-date on latest changes.

2. The city manager and building inspector should discuss the city attorney and city manager in the future on any matter not clearly defined in the zoning ordinance.

Robert Rogers of 32912 Slom, one of the strongest objectors during the parking 10 controversy, still questioned whether the bumper guards to set back in the parking lot were set back far enough. Another check by the city manager was called for.

In connection with this, Dinan reported further that a group of homeowners had met with the city officials to determine what could be done to muffle noises from machinery coming from the plant when doors were opened during the summer. The plant officials and subdivision homeowners committee are working together on a system whereby the noises can be muffled, it was revealed.

### Seeking More Aid for Planning

At its regular meeting Monday night, the Farmington City Council voted unanimously in favor of making application for federal funds to assist in a continuing planning program.

A total of \$2,200 will be sought in federal aid for additional planning work with another \$1,100 (one-third) to be put up by the city.

Councilmen were provided by City Manager John Dinan with a breakdown of how this money would be used. It was estimated that \$1,000 would be used for revisions and improvements of the general development plan being adopted for the city and another \$1,100 for the printing and distribution of 8,400 copies of this plan. Another \$800 was earmarked for presentation and discussion of this plan to various community clubs, organizations and governmental agencies.
