Universalist Church Topic Set for Dec. 27

What to tell our children about Santa Claus is coming in for hard scrutiny. This Christmas season of the ethical discussion group at the Universalist-Unitarian Church of Farmington.

The group, meeting each Sunday at 11 a.m. following the 10 a.m. service at the church, has been going into the causes, consequences and ethical values of fostering the Santa Claus story. Led by ROBERT Nelson of Farmington, the discussion group uses a unique method of considering points. One member of the group puts forward all his ideas on a given subject, others questioning him with an aim to understand his view rather than challenge it. In the future, the group plans to take up causes, consequences and ethical values of hyscience promises, being tactful, spying, government propaganda, hidden-persuader advertising, careless reporting, perjury, conformity, sugar coating and false modesty. Also meeting each week at the church is a discussion group considering current affairs, led by John Milliken of Farmington, and on alternate Sundays a music listening group hears records with commentaries by Donald Davidson of Farmington.

On Sunday, Dec. 27, Minister Robert M. Eddy will give the final talk in a three-part series on "The Christian Myth." Sunday's topic for the 10 a.m. service will be "Salvation."

James Hansen of Farmington, a sophomore at Central Michigan University in Mount Pleasant, is a member of the Central Michigan University ROTC rifle team. The Central cadets have their eye on a league championship.

LED BY CAPTAIN Dale Coffman, a senior from St. John, Central owns wins over the University of Detroit and the University of Michigan Army ROTC. They've dropped a close match to Eastern Michigan.

Starting in mid-January, the 13-man CMU squad takes on Bowling Green, Michigan State, University of Michigan Air Force, Toledo and a Western Michigan in quest of its first Southern Michigan - Northwestern Ohio ROTC Rifle League Title.

Last year Central finished in the first division of the nine-team conference and team advisor Lt. Col. Joseph Gause claims this season his team will "give them a real tussle for first."

The Central squad consists of 13 ROTC cadets. In each match, 10 team members fire although only the top five scorers from each team are counted. Each shooter fires 10 shots each from the prone, kneeling and standing positions. The best possible individual score is 300.

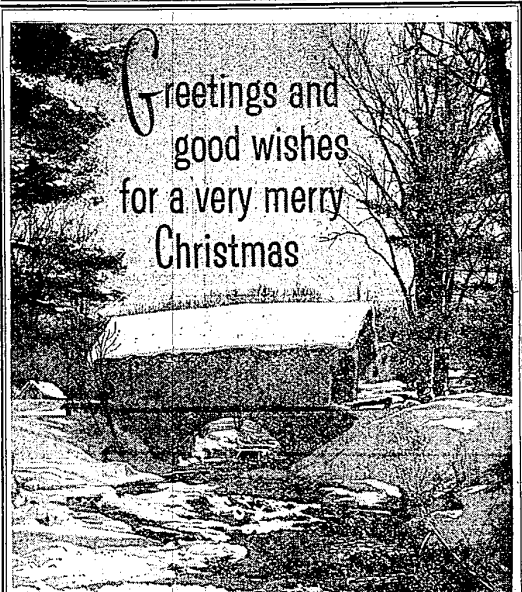
Refreshments were served which helped to make this a very enjoyable evening.
