State Curfew Law To Be Enforced Here

The curfew law for the City and Township of Farmington is the same as the curfew law for the State of Michigan. The law states that no children under the age of 12 shall be out between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., unless accompanied by an adult, parent, or guardian. Any minor under 16 shall not be out between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. unless accompanied by an adult, parent, or guardian. Any person over 16 who is with a minor under 16 is guilty of a misdemeanor. The curfew does not extend for those between 16 and 21.
