List Activities In Instrumental Music Program

Some 200 fourth grade students gathered at the Clarenceville High School on Wednesday, January 20, for their annual "Songfute Concert." These students have been preparing for this program since the start of the school year when they first began studying instrumental music.

The songfute is a pre-band instrument designed to offer instrumental music to young children on an inexpensive musical instrument. If a child does well and shows interest in further instrumental training, he may next enroll in a beginning band instrument class.

THE BEGINNING band classes will start on February 1 this year, and several of these students will switch to regular band instruments.

Both of these programs, along with the secondary school bands are under the direction of Mr. Ted Mallory (Jr. High) and Mr. John Nezek (Sr. High).

Another feature of the instrumental music program is this year's visit to the Clarenceville Schools of a Woodwind Trip composed of members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. This group will be in concert at the four elementary schools of February 6, for the benefit of the elementary students grades 4 through 6.

THE CONCERT will consist of regular repertory for this year, and a business group along with each individual performer discussing his instrument.

This is the second such program in Clarenceville having had a brass ensemble here last spring. It is the hope of the music staff that each year a small group of professional musicians can be brought here for concerts for children. These groups are organized and sponsored by the Detroit Adventure Series with several agencies contributing to their financial support.
