'Atheism' To Be Sunday's Topic At Uni-Uni. Ch. An examination of the term "atheism" and the varied concepts that surround it will be the subject of Minister Robert M. Eddy's talk Sunday, Jan. 28, at the 10 a.m. service of the Universalist - Unitarian Church of Farmington. The talk will be titled, "Is Atheism a Religion?" MR. EDDY SAID he would develop the idea that "a simple distinction between 'atheists' and 'theists' is outstanding in a view of modern intellectual thought." The local minister recently attended a conference at the University of Chicago on Religion, at which he heard papers and discussion of the general subject by several of the nation's outstanding theological and philosophical scholars. The other group, members of the church are considering educational matters. A music listening group is turning its attention to jazz music, specifically the blues.
