## Dr. D. L. McKinney To Speak To Village Woman's Club Jan. 29

Dr. D. L. McKinney, principal of the Detroit Youth Home School, will speak at the January 29 Village Woman's Club Junior Living Series. The talk, on the paths to delinquency and the relative importance of discipline, will be given at 2 p.m. in the Club lounge and is open to everyone, without charge.

The title of Dr. McKinney's talk "Somewhere in Between" refers to his concern that parents should not desire to be too strict or too lenient in raising children. Rather, the best course lies "somewhere in between."

MR. McKINNEY holds a Ph.D. in education from Wayne State University. Working as a school counselor in Detroit influenced his choice to concentrate upon the problems of juvenile delinquency.

He has taught in the Southfield Trade School, been a Detroit visiting teacher and an assistant principal with the Detroit Board of Education. At present he is principal of the Detroit Youth Home School and the D. J. Healy School for wards of the court. He is also affiliated with the President's commission on juvenile delinquency.

DR. McKINNEY, who lives in Franklin, has four children, ranging from grade school age to college. He is currently a PTA president.
