Offer Science Training for Prep Students

Several universities will offer summer science training programs for interested high school students this year.

Michigan State University will offer a special engineering program this summer for students in grades 10 and 11 who rank in the upper 25 per cent of their class.

Interested students who will have completed two years of math by June 30, should come to attend this program from June 30 to July 2, 1965.

A charge of \$120.00 is placed on each student to cover costs of meals, supplies, and room and board.

College-level instruction will also be given at various other universities throughout the United States this summer. Students wishing to attend any of these courses should have high scholastic ability, science motivation, and good high school record and math records in order to be selected. The student must also be able to pay his own room and board in most cases.

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J. N. Christianson Appointed To Direct Work on New College

Dr. Alan M. Potts of Royal Oak, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Michigan College of Osteopathic Medicine, announced this week the appointment of Mr. James N. Christianson of Farmington as the Director of the Department of College Development.

In this position, Mr. Christianson will direct and organize the raising of funds for the establishment of the new medical college. In his work he will report to J. Vincent Murphy, D.O. of Grand Blanc, Chairman of the Department.

PRIOR TO THIS appointment, Mr. Christianson was employed by the United Foundation of Metropolitan Detroit where he was Director of the General Manufacturing Unit. During his fourteen years with the United Foundation, he served in many professional capacities.

He also served as Regional Director for the University of Michigan's campaign to raise \$5-million for research in peacetime uses of atomic energy in 1948. Mr. Christianson co-founded and managed Boyne Mountain Lodge in Boyne Falls, Michigan. He presently holds two offices on this board. After four years of wartime service in the U.S. Navy, which included participation in several Pacific operations, Mr. Christianson was mustered out of the service in 1946 as a Lieutenant.

HE ATTENDED the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., and the University of Notre Dame Graduate School. He is married and the father of three children. They reside at 39115 Thirteen Mile Road in Farmington.

Dr. Potts commented that the Board of Trustees was highly pleased to have an individual with the experience and background of Mr. Christianson in this important task.
