

Zoning Board Agenda Jan. 28

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REVIEWERS ARE also planned to plan plans for development of a 30-acre parcel on the east side of Middlebelt Road, between 10 and 11 Mile Roads, a 10-acre parcel at the southwest corner of 13 Mile and Farmington Road and a 17-acre development at 14 Mile between Drake and Farmington roads. Three large residential developments are called for on these parcels.

The final plat for Westlake Subdivision No. 4 at the southeast corner of Tuck Road and Shawassee has been discussed with the zoning board and will be returned to the rezoning committee on a small piece of land at the northwest corner of 12 Mile and Rollers Street.

Recommended rezoning for the southwest corner of Middlebelt and 11 Mile Road is also scheduled for more discussion.

Voting in early times was done by using various colored stones or pellets. Each candidate was identified by a color.

Plan 'New Look'

THIS IS THE FIRST joint ownership of a central printing plant in the State of Michigan, to the best of our knowledge.

The management of each of the long established local newspapers having an interest in Inter-City Press, Inc. have made it clear that they want their newspapers to retain their individuality in the areas they serve.

The Enterprise, as well as the other papers, will continue to expand their present plan to include the Farmington Enterprise, Inc. in forming a separate central printing corporation. This newly formed corporation will be located in the City Press, Inc. with a plant located in Novi.

THE ADVANTAGES of composition and makeup to print by offset will be utilized but some present "hot type" letterpress printing will continue to be used.

Present Enterprise employees are being retained and trained in the new production methods. The target date for completion to printing of the newspaper by the new method has been set for the early part of April.

The Enterprise will do quality commercial printing work in its local plant. Already added to the Enterprise plant is a new commercial offset press to provide even better jobs and service in printing of this kind.

Library Vote on Expansion

Cruikshank and Mrs. Allison reported that the city's proposal to expand the library was considered at a special meeting of the library board of directors on Saturday. It was decided against since it would result in a delay in getting the new library building.

THE EXPLANATION was that since the "District Library System" has no bonding power it would be necessary to wait some time to get the cash on hand from the special tax levy proposed to go ahead with the expansion plan.

Trustees Earl Oppenheimer and James Byrnes asked if money "one mill tax levy" would yield more. It was stated that the annual yield from one mill levy would be \$100,000. The present state equalized valuation for the city and township combined would run approximately \$2,000,000.

Mrs. Allison was quick to add that if funds can be obtained locally for expansion by a special tax levy there is a very good chance that the local library system could qualify for as much as a quarter of a million dollars in state and federal grants for library expansion.

Trustee Byrnes asked if any consideration had been given by the library board of directors by long range expansion planning to the local libraries elsewhere in the community. Zuck and Mrs. Allison said that the plans did not call for such an expansion.

THE RECOMMENDATION for future expansion by library system authorities is that additional be made to the main library facility as proposed on 14 Mile as greater capacity is needed. The library officials said Mrs. Allison also indicated that the present library on Farmington Road would likely not be satisfactory and could not be expanded on enough to satisfy the needs of the southern portion of the township in five years. A new and larger library to serve public library needs for the City of Farmington.

IT WAS emphasized in the report of the planning consultants' letter that it was the township's comprehensive plan made for proper development as far as 1980. The township is now in the construction of new expressways and the announcement of plans for other roads and network development, coupled with numerous other circumstances, make revisions in the present comprehensive development plan for the township highly desirable.

The planning consultants felt that changes were particularly desirable with regard to the areas set aside for industrial and commercial development and the restrictions as specified a number of years back.

FARMINGTON HAS a school having power of 30.2 per cent, which is relatively high compared to other communities. 83.7 per cent is considered high. 70.2 per cent, average, and 54.2 per cent, low.

Of the 71 students who dropped out, 47 were male and 24 female. One student was 14, three were 15, four were 16, 17, 14 were 18, 5 were 19, and 1 was 20.

In IQ ability, 30 were classified in the lower quartile, 19 in the second quartile, 16 in the third quartile, 4 in the upper quartile and 4 were unknown.

In reading ability, 40 were found to be below grade level, 19 were average, 16 were above grade level, 8 were unknown.

On the average, 50 were below average placement, 50 were above average and 21 were average.

OTHER STATISTICS showed that 38 of the drop-outs were poor attendance record; the education of the family provided or stopped at the elementary level; 29 the students' parents and at the secondary level; 23; the occupation of the family provider was skilled for 11 students, semi-skilled for 16, unskilled and unemployed for 16.

Shiawassee Has Sewer Problem

A sewer problem at Shiawassee School came up for discussion at the Board of Education meeting on January 25. By special arrangement, the school's sewer line has been connected to the City of Farmington's sewer system. The connection is three or four blocks from the school which necessitates the use of two pumps.

RECENTLY ONE pump failed and is beyond repair. Temporary trucking of sewage is being done, but school administrators said that the pump would have to be replaced at the cost of \$1,000 or arrangements could be made to tap into the Township sewer which is now just across from the school. The cost would be \$1,700 for connection plus \$1,750 for inter-pump charges.

ALSO, THE REPORT on the water connection at Gill Road School was that it would be more economical to bring the line in from Gill Road.

The Board authorized school administrators to employ Pipe and Hm Engineers to prepare plans and specifications for the water connection at Gill Road School and a permanent sewer connection of the Shiawassee School to the new sewer on the south side of Shiawassee.

They also authorized the taking of bids to be received at their next regular meeting on February 8, for the two projects.

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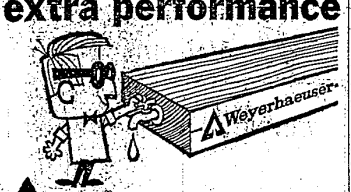
