Start Planning Many Technical Courses for Oakland College

Thirty-nine community leaders representative of Oakland County groups met with the Board of Trustees and staff of Oakland Community College last week.

Board Chairman George Mosher opened the important meeting by stating, "We are greatly indebted to you outstanding community leaders and look forward to your counsel and advice in the development of the Oakland Community College. We will look to you for counsel on broad policy matters at one or two of these meetings each year."

Dr. B. Lamar Johnson, of the University of California at Los Angeles, discussed the national trends in the community college field. Dr. Johnson has been assigned by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools to assist the local community college in securing accreditation.

COLLEGE PRESIDENT John T. Tirrell indicated some of the socio-economic changes that have produced the rapidly increasing requirements for community colleges. He cited figures which indicated that while in 1955 only 14 per cent of the Michigan college students were enrolled in community colleges, next fall this percentage will be 30. "This is not unreasonable," he added, "since in California, the community colleges now enroll over 70 per cent of the college freshmen."

Dr. Albert A. Canfield, Vice President for Instruction, presented data on changes in the population by age groups, and the growth of age structure of the labor force which indicates the large numbers of requirements for post high school education. For example, in 1950 over 50 per cent of the labor force had an 8th grade education or less, while in 1963 over 50 per cent of the labor force had a high school education or more.

From studies made by earlier citizen's committees and membership surveys, programs were presented for possible implementation in September, 1963.

CHAIRMAN MOSHER said that the comments and suggestions furnished by the Advisory Council were most helpful. A group of six or eight knowledgeable citizens will be asked to serve as an Advisory Committee for each of the programs selected for implementation.

The technical education program being considered for Oakland College are: accounting, architectural, automotive, aviation engineering, civil technology, commercial and marketing, construction, data processing, mechanical engineering, professional nursing, teaching, office management, pre-medical technology, nursing fields, insurance and real estate sales, food service technology, electrical engineering, construction technology, and dental assistance technology.

B. Cantor to Teach Special Trade Course

"Patents, Trade-marks and Copyrights" is a new course being taught by Bernard J. Cantor, of Farmington, Detroit patent attorney at Wayne State University's Applied Management and Technology Center. The course begins on February 8, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at the Center's new location, 940 Temple, Detroit.

Cantor needs a large headroom. He will conduct the 12-week adult education course designed for inventors, businessmen, designers, engineers, and others whose work or interest includes new inventions, patents, and new product marketing.

Cantor is a member of the Detroit law firm of Cullen, Stoman and Cantor, and is the author of many articles on patent law. A patent examiner with the United States Patent Office, Washington, D.C., from 1949 to 1952, he holds an engineering degree from Cornell University and a doctor of law degree from George Washington University.
