Cosumers Power Company Plans Expansion in 1965

More than \$5,500,000 will be invested by Consumers Power Company in its West Wayne division during 1965 to expand and improve natural gas service to its customers. West Wayne Division Manager James P. Thomas, Jr., announced Thursday.

Mr. Thomas said the division encompassing the communities of Wayne, Plymouth, Northville, Farmington, Livonia and others, will add 3,750 new gas customers during the year.

To bring service to these more than 50 miles of new gas distribution mains will be installed in the division service area.

In addition, improvements to eight miles of older mains, affecting some 200 existing gas customers, will also be completed during the year.

In a related project, improvements to equipment at the company's Northville gas fields and gas compressor stations will be made, increasing the efficiency of this key installation in the company's state-wide gas transmission system.

Specific projects listed by Mr. Thomas include the installation of six miles of new six and eight-inch gas main along Farmington Road from Plymouth

to Eight Mile in Livonia, making way for the proposed widening of Farmington Road.

NUMEROUS OTHER projects of a technical nature will also be completed during the year, to maintain efficient service and assist the orderly growth of the gas system through use of natural gas by area customers.

Mr. Thomas said the West Wayne division expansion program is part of Consumers Power Company's general 1965 improvement program, in which the company is investing \$2,000,000 on projects throughout its 66-county service area in Michigan's Lower Peninsula.

He said that in 1964, Consumers spent just over \$2,000,000 in new construction projects in its West Wayne division.
