

Approve Dividing of Parcel on Maple St.

The division of a parcel of this parcel into three single lots at the corner of Freedom Drive into three residential building lots for homes in the \$20,000 to \$25,000 price range was officially approved by action of the City Council at its regular meeting Monday night.

The request for division of this parcel into three single family home building lots came from Virgil Cornwell, local builder and developer.

Action came following assurances given by the city manager and city attorney that the council was within its legal rights in taking action of this kind.

Sewer Problem Still Up in Air

The knotty and much discussed matter of coming up with a method of correcting the drainage and sewage disposal problem that prevails in the valley area south of Shawansee between Lakeview and Prospect streets came in for another round of lengthy debate at the City Council meeting Monday night.

A plan developed by the city engineer to correct the problem was not felt to be satisfactory by Carl Shaw, of 31821 Valleyview, who has borne the brunt of the trouble with the presently inadequate storm and sanitary sewage disposal system.

Shaw stated that the plans submitted by the engineer did not exactly show the location of existing lines. He felt further that a larger new line than the 15-inch line specified should be installed.

After better than a half hour of discussion, councilmen decided to ask for still another field study of the situation in view of Shaw's comments.

The Township office of the matter of the availability of the records, but had not had time to prepare for the hearing being held at it and asked again that the matter be adjourned.

Norman Kreider, president of Wood Creek Farms Village, indicated that he wished to make a statement, but would rather defer it if the board intended to adjourn the hearing. The board agreed to allow him to make his statement before any action was taken on the matter. Then asked to hear any citizens who might not be able to come to a later meeting if the hearing were adjourned.

BERNARD KAHN, 28545 Sugar Spring, stated that he was opposed to multiple family dwellings because he is in the process of drilling a new well to replace one that had gone dry, and that multiple housing in the area would create too much of a drain on existing water.

Lola Kahn, 28545 Sugar Spring, said she was opposed to multiple dwellings because of the traffic hazard and the school problem. She said that she had checked with the Oakland County Road Commission and had been told that there had been 20 accidents including 40 injuries and two fatalities at the corner of Middlebelt and Thirteen Mile roads and that apartment at the corner would increase the hazard.

MRS. KAHN POINTED OUT that Highwood, the newest elementary school, is already filled; and she felt that the school system couldn't take the extra load from multiple housing.

Feggy By, 23333 Millbrook, stated that she was concerned about traffic at the corner and that she had gone to the Township office to see the petition for rezoning. She questioned a list of recommendations on the back of the petition, one of which was the possibility that the "big red house" on the corner of Thirteen Mile and Middlebelt roads might be condemned.

MARTIN GLENNSTEIN, 32401 Chesterbrook, had calculated the density of the development and said, "35 to 42 people per acre would be an unwarranted density." He also mentioned the traffic problem and the school burden. Then he suggested, "If the Township Board would like to participate in the program which calls for an evaluation of plans for the Township and the possibility of a change from a Zoning Board to a Planning Board, the item should be put over."

No one else wishing to be heard, the board adjourned the hearing on a three-to-one vote with Charles Skillman and Grace Richardson, were absent.

Begin on Tuesday disclosed that Futurmill plans considerable expansion in the future to keep pace with its past growth.

FUTURMILL, INC., was organized April 1953 in the State of Michigan and maintains principal offices at 1920 West Eight Mile Road, Southfield. A wholly owned subsidiary, Futurmill (Canada) Ltd., has offices in Toronto, Ontario, Canada while an 80 per cent owned subsidiary, Caribool, Inc. has offices and facilities at Futurmill's Eight Mile Road plant.

Over the past several years, Futurmill, Inc. has been engaged in the sale and manufacture of its patented indexable blade milling cutters and certain machine tool items, notably a high horsepower multi-spindle used in converting planers to planer-mills. Both products are relatively new — the latter started in 1949, the spin-off in 1954 — and are sold through some cutting tool or machine tool distributors across the country. The products originate with a proposed planer-mill in Detroit.

DETROIT MILLING CUTTER CO., which was purchased by Futurmill, Inc. in 1957.

IN THE PAST FIVE YEAR period, Futurmill, Inc. has grown from \$1,200,000 for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1960, to \$2,400,000 for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1964.

Futurmill (Canada) Ltd., organized and incorporated in January 1957, sells in Canada the same products made by Futurmill, Inc. Some are purchased from Futurmill, Inc. and some are purchased from local Canadian suppliers, including one utilizing equipment furnished by Futurmill (Canada) Ltd.

CARBITOOL, INC. was organized and incorporated in October 1950 and engaged in the manufacture of various solid carbide cutting tools such as drills, end mills, reamers, boring tools and burrs. Sales are made directly to customers and to a growing list of distributors throughout the country.

Eventual sales of both Futurmill, Inc. and its subsidiaries are to be a broad expansion of the "national metal-working" industry and there are an estimated 3,000 to 5,000 individual owners currently. A few of the important segments of the metalworking industry represented are aircraft and missile manufacturers, machine tool builders, motor and pump manufacturers, automotive manufacturers, tool and die shops and steel fabricators.

An engineer has been hired to assist in the attempt to develop foreign machine tool sales.

THE COMPANY HAS one branch office and the offices of whom five are District Managers, located at strategic locations across the United States. The District Managers work with a total of eighty-six distributors in the promotion of sales.
