B of E Completes With HEW 41

The Farmington Board of Education, at a regular meeting on or about January 8, 1965, has completed the work of the Board. The Board has adopted the new HEW 41, Assurance of Compliance with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Regulation Under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Section 80.4 of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Regulation Under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 requires that every application to the Department for Federal financial assistance, which shall contain or be accompanied by an Assurance that the program or facility to be assisted will be operated in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act and with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to the Department's Regulation.

Section 80.4 also provides for the form of the Assurance; and HEW Form 41 has been specified as the form of Assurance which shall apply to all applications for Federal financial assistance.

Area Pioneer Dies In Sacramento, Calif.

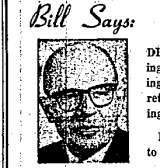

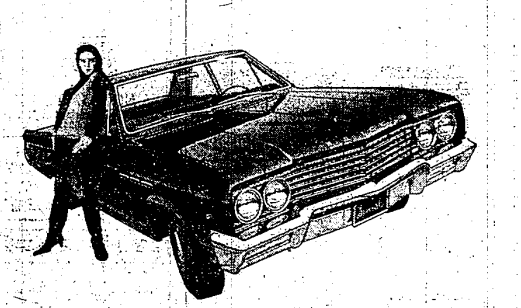
