Two other members of the planning commission, besides Brotherton who are seeking councilman's chairs are John Allen and Ralph Yoder.

Allen was appointed to the planning commission in 1950 and has served continuously since that time. He was also the city's representative on the Farmington City and Township District Library Board until his resignation recently and has been active in the city in other capacities which include architectural designing work. Allen was the architect for the city's new municipal building.

Yoder was first appointed to the city's planning commission in June of 1961, and was appointed again for another three-year term in June of 1964. He was an unsuccessful candidate for a Council seat in the city election two years ago.

SAUTER is the most recent of the five candidates running who hold some elected or appointed city office to assume an official city position. He was named as the city's representative on the district Library board in July of last year.

Wale Cornell has held no positions in or for the city government in the past but is well known in the community. A builder and developer, he was one of the driving forces behind the development of the Downtown Center shopping district. In the city election two years ago, Cornell was edged out in his bid for a seat on the Council by only 21 votes by Councilman Forrest.

The only real newcomer to Farmington City politics is Rogers. Despite never having held or run for any city office, however, he has shown an interest in city government affairs by attending Council and planning commission meetings frequently.

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Two Bee Owner Gets Stung by Judge Ingle

Richard W. Gerathy of 22600 Middlebelt Road in Farmington Township appeared in Farmington Township Justice of the Peace Allen C. Ingle's Court on Monday, February 15, and was found guilty of violating Section 10 of the Apiary Inspection Law, Act No. 26, P.A. 1935, as amended, for failure to register his apiaries in 1964.

Charges were brought against Gerathy, who was fined \$15 and \$9 court costs, by James E. Terrill of the Michigan Department of Agriculture's Plant Industry Division.

Mr. Gerathy operates apiaries (46) in South Lyon Township and (9) in Saline Township of the Marion Brothers Farm.

Mile Road just east of Farmington Road within the next two years and in getting the new library stocked with a substantial number of books initially.

IT WAS EXPRESSED with some certainty also that if an 18,000 square foot building is constructed on the five-acre site on 12 Mile Road the lower levy would not permit any new library facility for the southern portion of the community for a number of years. The present library facility for citizens in the southern portion of the community would just have to do, Czubak commented.

The re-evaluation figures presented were predicated on a 25 per cent population and property valuation increase in the community in the next ten years. Mrs. Allison and Czubak both agreed with Supervisor Curt Hall that this was very conservative figuring. New industrial and commercial development in the community along with residential growth could boost the community's valuation substantially above this percentage, Hall pointed out.

Wounded In Viet Nam Raid

S-4C Clifford C. Higgins, Jr. of Farmington was wounded in a Viet Cong raid on Phuoc, South Viet Nam, February 7, while serving with the U.S. Armed Forces advisory team in Viet Nam.

The Farmington soldier is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Higgins, Sr. of 22133 Forestbrook Drive in Farmington. His parents received notification from the U.S. War Department on Monday at 4 a.m. of their son being wounded. His injuries were listed as due to grenade fragments and was reported recovering in the Eighth Army Field Hospital in Nha Trang, South Viet Nam.

Higgins was graduated from Detroit Catholic Central High School and attended Michigan State University prior to joining the U.S. Army in April of 1962. He completed basic training at Fort Knox, Kentucky and paratrooper training at Fort Benning, Georgia before taking up his assignment with the U.S. advisory forces in South Viet Nam in April of last year.
