A banking schedule of 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 9:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Fridays has been established by the new branch. The three other National Bank of Detroit offices serving the Farmington area are located at Farmington Road and the question: "Is this bank Loma Drive in Downtown Farmington (Branch 51), 12 Mile and Farmington Road in the Kendallwood Shopping Center (Branch 64) and 14 Mile Road at Middlebelt in the Franklin Shopping Center (Branch 70).

The new Farmington branch manager is Joseph A. Fraum, assistant manager of the branch at Thomas Carrick. They had originally planned to open the temporary trailer banking center at 9:30 a.m. but it was finally 9:30 a.m. before snow was sufficiently cleared the way to permit normal operations. Between Alta Loma and Freedom Drive for office, research and education or campus development.

This statement was asked to be put into effect after planning commission minutes to show that possible development of the parcel in this manner was not the idea of the planners but rather recommended for consideration by members of the Economic Development Committee.

FORREST CHARGED that the statement made in the Economic Development Committee minutes that this was true but that it in no way altered the intent of the statement that had been made by Forrest.

Councilman Forrest now seems to be doing badly behind Alta Loma homeowners who contend that anything other than residential development of this parcel would be detrimental to them, from a property value and nuisance standpoint.

argument that the 15 inch line would not be large enough. He made several points of his own in an effort to convince city officials that a larger line should be put in but was apparently not as convincing to councilmen as Papke, a professional engineer.

Unless the Council reverses its decision as a result of the report that comes back from the state health department of the plans and engineering data submitted, installation of the proposed new line should be able to be started as soon as equipment can be moved into that area this spring.

DEFENSE DEPARTMENT films and training kits will be used by the instructors for visual aids. Although no exams will be given certificates will be presented to those persons who satisfactorily complete the course.

Maurice Foltz, Director of the Farmington City Public Safety Department, has also announced the scheduling of a Radiological Monitoring Class. This course is open to all adult residents of Farmington and will be held for five consecutive weeks beginning Tuesday, March 9 at 7:30 p.m. at Cloverleaf School.

Ervin Schreiber, the Chemical and Radiological Officer for Oakland County, is very well qualified to serve as instructor for these classes.

HOPE WAS expressed that as many people as possible would attend these classes so that Farmington — because of its proximity to a major target — will be an area well-prepared in the event of any disaster.

No advance registration is required for either course but interested persons are asked to be at the school 15 minutes early for registration. There is no charge for either course.

have to be hiked down the original 810 per front foot cost figure set at \$2 per front foot.

City Manager John Dinan stated. The city's cost, approximately 25 per cent, will run \$142.25 and will come out of the water and sewer department's funds for capital improvements.

MANAGER Dinan pointed out to councilmen that one industrial plant already under construction on the drive was started on the assurance that water and sewer facilities would be provided. He added that providing these facilities would also make it possible for six or seven more plants to be built on the drive which would result in over million dollars worth of additional value to the city.
