(Continued from Page 1-A) UNDER THE CONTRACT the County will reimburse the School District for the initial equipment and operating expenses of the room. The District will also receive entitlement to reimbursement of construction costs for the room on a per square foot basis to be paid at some future time when funds are available.

Harrison stated that the room at Cloverdale School will be moved to Larkshire School; and when funds are available costs of the second room may be reimbursed as well.

The State has not been paying total reimbursement for special education programs and the County has been making up the difference; but it can no longer continue to do so unless funds are made available. The bill to be voted on in June will provide the necessary funds if passed.

The main charge made in the plaintiffs' complaint of mandamus is that Attorney Brennan should have disqualified himself from rendering any opinion on this matter in view of the fact that he had represented Thomas Duke on legal matters in the past. It is also alleged that the township attorney's opinion may have been slanted in view of the fact that Duke is a member of the Township Board and he and Brennan are personal friends.

Local Singer Wins Award

Mrs. Frank J. (Patricia) Szymanski last week won the highest award at the annual Kiwanis Talent Festival in Chatham, Ontario, Canada. It is the contention of the plaintiffs that they did have sufficient number of people registering opposition to the rezoning action to warrant a referendum vote on the subject.

THE REPEAL announcement of the court action that had been started, Duke was permitted to present his site plan to the Board. The rezoning of the six other members of the Board voted unanimously to approve the plan as submitted.

It was pointed out prior to this action that the Township Zoning Board had reviewed the same plan earlier and had voted 4-2 in favor of approving it as submitted.

Duke explained in his presentation that he had provided in his planned development all the things that zoning board members had requested him to do in order to assure adequate protection to the property values of surrounding land owners. He emphasized that the drive around the entire 360 acres had an adequate greenbelt and shrubbery planted on the outside of it as he had promised.

Also pointed out by him was the fact that the amount of property he had said he would allocate for a golf course was lived up to as were all the other things he promised would be in the development to make it an asset to the community.

Zoning Board's and Township Board's action approving the rezoning as requested by the local developers following months of discussion, Berger and a small group of neighbors opposing the rezoning decided to start a petition drive in an effort to get the matter placed on a referendum vote of the people. Petitions signed by over 1,100 people calling for the referendum vote were filed with the township just prior to the legally required deadline.

AN OPINION handed down shortly afterwards by Township Attorney Joseph T. Brennan ruled that the numerous signatures on the petitions were sufficient to require township officials to place the matter to a referendum vote. He pointed out further in his opinion that the petition was not properly worded nor was a clear enough description of the property given.

The request of John Anhalt, president of Botsford Inn, to rezoning property between the Inn and Botsford Hospital was unanimously approved by the Board. The request was to rezone 8 1/2 acres from RA-4 to RC Multiple and approximately 7 1/2 acres from RA-4 to B-3, general business.

The request of Fred Seel of 2663 12 Mile Road to rezone an approximately one-half acre parcel on the southwest corner of 12 Mile and Halsted roads from B-1 to general business, was also approved. Plans call for a swimming pool and a sales and supplies store on the corner.

Alta Loma Homeowners Win Out 'Okay Liquor' License Change

"The most obvious difficulty with both plans is that the developer would provide a parking lot to assemble all of the parcels; in question before he would start development. Otherwise he would not be assured of being able to carry out the proposed street layout," the report stated.

The Farmington Township Board took official action Monday night approving the transfer of a bar liquor license and wine license to a new location. The liquor license transfer approved was for the bar and restaurant at 31650 Eight Mile Road and was transferred from Robert Yukson to Harvey C. Chapman and Thomas E. Goers.

It was pointed out by Driker in concluding that "no doubt there are many ways in which this land could be subdivided; the real test would come in the control of the zoning board to keep strong teeth in the ordinance spelling out the restrictions and leaving any possible exceptions to be taken up through the channels of the City's Board of Appeals.

Both transfers still must be given approval from the State Board of Liquor Control.
