Farmington Downs Waterford To Open League Cage Action

Farmington's varsity cagers now share first place honors with defending champ, Fontaine Northern, as a result of their 78-71 triumph over Waterford last Friday evening.

Victory in their league opener was a start for the team. With league membership reduced to four teams, a defeat at this early stage could have been fatal to the team's title hopes.

The Birds started quickly, scorning the nets for 24 points in the first quarter, largely on the effectiveness of a leading press. Guard Mike Wilson was a vital link in the press, which up to this game had not been applied to successfully by the Falcons, for his frequent interceptions and deflected passes resulted in many scores by his teammates.

Though down by a large margin after the first eight minutes, the Skippers battled back to trail by only three points, 39-36, at halftime.

Farmington was outscored by Waterford, 18-16, in the third quarter, to go into the final stanza with a precarious one point lead.

Then the Blue and White quietest came up with something they had been lacking all season: a quick burst of scoring to break open a close contest. Within the space of one minute, the Birds pumped in seven points while holding the visitors scoreless.

Then even vital points eventually turned out to be the margin of victory for the Falcons, who evened their season's record at 4-1.

Coach Quigley received something else from his cagers, something which must be present each week if they are to present a serious challenge for the conference title. That important element is scoring balance.

Bid for League Title Launched By North Farmington Cagers

North Farmington edged into a four-way tie for first place in the Northwest Suburban League by starting the fourth quarter rally to trip Livonia Franklin, 50-42.

The victory raised North Farmington's League record to 35-33.

North Farmington began to look like a decent basketball team in the fourth quarter and, for the first time in the game, built up a substantial lead. The Raiders contended from their standard man-to-man defense to a loose zone defense. The change was successful and Franklin managed only one field goal in the final period while North Farmington hit five field goals and seven of nine foul shots to outscore the Patriots, 17-7, and win the game by eight points.

In compiling their 3-2 won-loss record this year, the Raiders have outscored their five opponents in over-all totals in field goals as well as in foul shots. In five games, North Farmington has hit 112 field goals while giving up 106 to opponents. The Raiders have made good on 83 of their free throw attempts, while opponents have converted 71. NF is currently averaging 69.4 points per game, while allowing 56.6 points per game. It is slightly higher in league play with NF points.

North Farmington's victory over Franklin was gained at the free throw line, as the Raiders hit for only 15 field goals, to Franklin's 17, but were good on 20 of 30 free throws, while the Livonia team was good for only 8 of 16.

Both teams were cold throughout most of the game, and Franklin held a slim three point lead for the majority of the first three quarters. After the minutes of play (33 to 11, the teams were deadlocked at 15-15. An even scored second quarter produced a half-time
