Use Paint to Style Rooms

Modern color styling with today's magic paints can make your rooms look larger, and ceilings higher, low ceilings lower. There is practically no fault that cannot be corrected, and color is used correctly.

Today's paints put color to work inexpensively. They are easily applied and come in every color imaginable. The proper use of paint is known as "paint styling."

Paint styling is the technique of using colorful coatings in such a way that good features of a room, a house, a building, a piece of furniture, or almost any object are emphasized, and the unattractive features are disguised and minimized. Paint styling brings out good taste and individual personality.

How do you emphasize a good feature?

Easy. You surround it with an area of a different color, so that this good feature stands out spotlighted in color.

And how do you minimize a bad feature? You make sure that its nature is camouflaged, merges into the background, thus becoming less noticeable.

An integral part of paint styling is to learn how this can be done, there are a few basic principles:

1. **LIGHT COLORS** reflect more light. They make things seem larger but at the same time lighter in weight. They make things seem farther away. They are "up beat," and generate cheer.
2. **DARK COLORS** absorb light. They made things look smaller and heavier. They make things seem closer. If used on too large surfaces, they can tend to depress.
3. **BRIGHT COLORS** make areas seem larger than they are. They attract the eye and can be used to draw attention away from unattractive objects. Used in large quantities they can be distracting.
4. **WARM COLORS**—the reds, oranges, yellows and yellow greens—seem to advance toward you. They convey a feeling of warmth and are emotionally stimulating.
5. **COOL COLORS**—the blues, violets, blue-greens and blue-grays—make things seem cool. They seem to retreat from you. They are relaxing.

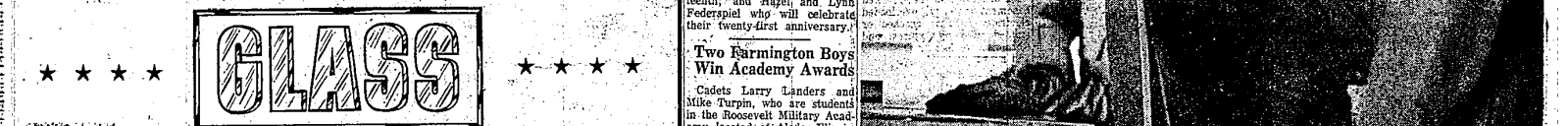
