## Edison Co. Mgr. Harley Walters To Retire After 39 Years Here

Harley Walters, manager of the Farmington Office of the Detroit Edison Company, will retire today (March 31) after 39 years of service with the utility company.

A leading citizen and businessman of the community during his many years with the Edison Company, Walters is a life-time resident of Farmington. He is a past president of the Farmington businessmen's Exchange Club, Treasurer of the Farmington Historical Society and a member of the Farmington Masonic Lodge, F. and A. M. No. 1051.

Walters has many recollections of Farmington's early days. He has chronicled a few of the experiences he has had during his 39 years with the Edison Office in Farmington: "THE EDISON OFFICE was located on Farmington Road, opposite the former Enterprise building. When I began work there January 18, 1926, "My duties were to assist the Local Manager, installing and reading meters, general service work and repairing electric ranges. There was little resemblance in appearance to the modern building. The Edison Office in Farmington was a small, one-story building. It was turned loose with a bag of tools and my Model T Ford Roadster to serve our customers in Farmington township and part of Livonia.

"There were many humorous incidents, which compensated for the lack of modern conveniences. Alex Dow and Sarah Sheridan were President and Vice President of the company, their principles of fair dealing with customers, investors and employees have since been maintained by their successors.

"I HAVE MANAGED THE Farmington Office since 1948 and have enjoyed being a part of Detroit Edison Company. "My only definite plans for the future are to continue living in Farmington in the home we have occupied the past thirty-eight years. We like to travel and having a daughter in Riverside, California, furnish an excuse for that trip and it isn't too difficult to think of one for Florida."

sources than expected. Some of it is also money received from the sale of property owned by the township, including the old Township Hall in the City of Farmington, which the township had a substantial financial interest in.

The second fund will be known as the Township Improvement Revolving Fund. The total being transferred from the general fund into this fund will be \$16,618.22. This represents a substantial portion of the money collected from the special two mill levy which township voters approved earlier to provide for improvements in the police and fire departments in the township.

Members of the board made it clear during general discussion on the action taken in setting up this second improvement fund that they wanted the two mills approved by the voters for police and fire protection improvements spent in total for these purposes. They agreed, also, that it should be spent as much as possible equally for the two forms of protection improvements.

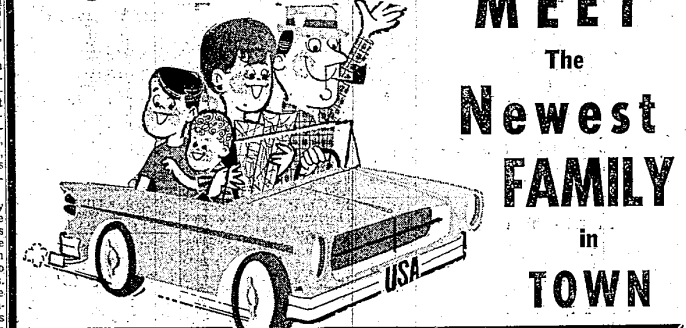
