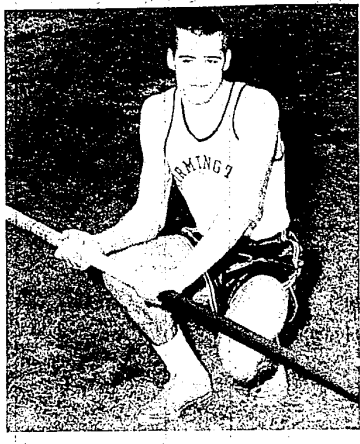

Shortt, a junior who starred as a defensive halfback on the Falcon football team last fall, missed almost all of last year's track season when he cracked his wrist on a pre-spring vault during indoor drills. Falcon track coach Fordy Kennedy expects the young athlete to clear 13 feet in the pole vault before hanging up his spikes this spring.

FHS Varsity Team Downs Faculty In Benefit Game

For the second time in as many years the FHS Varsity Club seniors overhauled the old men of the Faculty Team by the score of 50-32 in the annual benefit game co-sponsored by CIHU and the Varsity Club. The game provided much entertainment as close to 600 people paid the \$50 admission price to watch the Faculty vainly try to avenge last year's defeat at the hands of the Lettermen.

The faculty team showed a weakness in wanting to depend on one or two men, who, for one reason or another, could not dress for Thursday's game. Nevertheless, the game was played as the Varsity Club drew first blood and led from the outset.

The difference in the game probably came at the first throw line as the Varsity Clubbers cashed in on numerous opportunities for charity points, due to Faculty misuses.

Two Re-Zoning Requests OK'd

The Farmington Township Board took action on two rezoning proposals at their regular meeting Monday night, April 12, both measures had received the unanimous approval of the Township Zoning Board prior to formal adoption Monday night.

The first rezoning request changes the southwest corner of Halsted Road and 12 Mile Road from B-1 (Community Business District) to B-3 (General Business District). A swimming pool supply business is planned on the corner formerly the site of a small grocery store.

IN THE SECOND rezoning matter approved by the Township Board, the Botsford Inn property at Eight Mile Road and Grand River Avenue, was rezoned to conform with the present use since a portion of the property extended beyond the 100 foot depth required by the River zoning for General Business. A portion of the RA-4 zoning was changed to RC (Multiple Residence District) because a portion was changed to B-3 (General Business District) to bring those portions of the Botsford Inn restaurant and motel into conformity with the zoning required for such operations.

Police Clear Backlog of Cases With Arrest

Farmington Township Police arrested a man and two women companions Friday night, April 9, in a stolen car and learned after questioning that the man was responsible for the theft of at least 20 automobiles extending back over a three-month period and also was involved in numerous burglaries and robberies in the Township and surrounding communities.

Farmington Township Police Detective Russell Conway arrested the suspect after receiving a stolen car report from West Bloomfield Police. Conway first spotted the stolen car parked at Keller's cabins in the Township. Conway and three other officers, Detective Charles Whitlock of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, and officers Arlo Newell and George Maier of the Township, stalked out from 3 Grand River address from 3 p.m. Friday until 8:50 p.m. Friday when the man and two women left the cabin, got in the stolen car and proceeded to drive away. Police trailed the trio, at speeds of up to 90-miles-an-hour, on the Grand River - Brighton Expressway. The car was finally pulled over at Novi Road and 12 Mile Road.

Stolen property was recovered from the car and the driver, linking the man to numerous breaking and entering cases as well as recent larcenies in the area. He was arraigned before the Justice of the Peace in West Bloomfield and held over for trial in Oakland County Circuit Court.

FRS Team Officials Send Council Letter

FHS voted the top job of City Manager to Mike Freeman while roles as councilmen were allotted in favor of Ray Biggs, Mike Maatela, Linda Woehler, Debbie Halperin, Linda Terry, Marsha Dembecki and Jill McElroy.

Students who were voted to School Board trusteeships at FHS were Judy Hennessey, Perry Jamieson, King Cotton, Dave Cornwall and Thomas Waring.

THE OTHER POSTS in City government, mostly appointive offices, were voted to Terry Nielsen (City Attorney), Dick Johnston (City Clerk), Neil Stark (City Assessor), Rick Kupferschmidt (Municipal Judge), Tom Winfree (Director of Public Safety), John Karwowski (Building Inspector), Keith Collins (Lt. of Public Safety), Terry Taggart (Supt. of Water and Sewer), Dick Belanger (Supt. of Public Works), Gary Allan Lockwood (Associate Judge) and John Esser (City Treasurer).

The students assumed their respective roles Tuesday and in addition to attending City Council and School Board meetings Monday night, they were feted at a luncheon Tuesday noon and later conducted a mock City Council meeting in the Municipal building to conclude the Student Government Day program.

Rep. Baker Sponsors School Speed Bill

Representative Raymond Baker of Farmington (64th State House District) has introduced a bill in the State legislature seeking to establish lower speed limits in school zones. The measure, House Bill No. 2129, has been referred to the House Committee on Public Safety.

The Farmington Township Board took official action at their regular meeting Monday night, April 12, supporting Rep. Baker's bill. The bill will amend the Michigan Vehicle Code, if approved by the legislature, to set speed limits in school zones at 15 mph from one-half an hour before school opens until one-half an hour after school closes every day school is in session.

Beautification Comm.

The initial step was taken by the Farmington City Council Monday calling for the establishment of a permanent beautification committee to make recommendations and work on projects to enhance the beauty of the city.

Councilmen agreed that such a permanent committee would be very desirable and instructed the city manager to put this matter on the agenda for more detailed discussion either at its next meeting or the meeting following.

The suggestion for a permanent beautification committee came from newly elected councilman Ralph Voder and was wholeheartedly endorsed by the other council members. Discussion on this matter was prompted by a letter from state Arbor Day officials urging a special tree planting and replacement program during Arbor Day week the last of this month. A special tree planting ceremony will be held at the municipal building grounds on April 27 but it was agreed that there was a little time left to do much more than this in conjunction with Arbor Day this year on a city-wide basis.
