The first phase of construction on the 12 million dollar project is expected to be completed in time for classes to open in the fall of 1966 with the balance of the development scheduled for completion by the fall of 1967. Construction bids on the seven million dollar first phase are expected to be let this August. The Orchard Ridge Community College will have an enrollment of approximately 4,500 students when fully developed.

Receive Bids On Police Cars

Serving on the Township's committee on cars are Board Trustees Earl Oppenheimer, Byron Walter and Thomas A. Duke. They are expected to make their recommendation to the Board at the next meeting.




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
