

## Farmington Schools Plan Student Art Exhibition

An exhibit of student art will be displayed May 4 through May 10 at the Farmington Plaza on Grand River at Orchard Lake.

Nearly all of the twenty Farmington Public Schools will participate in the program which will occupy the windows of the former Morris Store.

Originally planned as a Michigan Week Exhibit, the display dates were changed when the space at this location became available. Last year's Michigan Week exhibit was displayed in numerous windows throughout the Farmington area. This year, as an experiment, it was decided to use the one central location to combine the materials into one comprehensive exhibit or display.

FARMINGTON ELEMENTARY Art Consultants will collect student work from each of the fifteen elementary schools and will share the exhibit space with student work from the classes of Junior and Senior High School art and industrial art teachers.

Although space will not allow each of the more than 10,000 Farmington students to exhibit, it will provide viewers an opportunity to see work from each of the schools and to grasp some understanding of the scope and breadth of the arts program in the area schools.

COORDINATING THE display will be Robert Benjamin, Elementary Art Consultant, working with Donald Keen, Assistant Principal at East Junior High and Byron Oliver, District Administrative Assistant, who will coordinate materials from Art and Industrial Art, respectively, in both Junior and Senior High Schools.


