Miss Heckman obtained a BS degree (Later Elementary Education) from Eastern Michigan University in 1947. From there she went on to a Master's degree in School Administration, from Michigan State University.

MISS HECKMAN ALSO has had wide teaching experience at Wilson School in Mt. Clemens, Michigan; in Cleveland Heights, Ohio; Birmingham, Michigan; and for the last four years she has been the Elementary Mathematics Supervisor. This summer she plans to attend the National Science Institute at Columbia University in New York City.

The exhibit will take place during Michigan Week, May 17-22. The League's concerns range from voters' service to local, state, and national problems of vital interest and all will be represented.

Visitors can test their knowledge of the ABC's of state government on a giant quiz board. A display of Con-Con will review a long period of hard work culminating in a successful revision of the State Constitution. 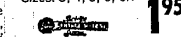

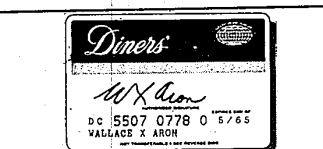
